MESSAGE FROM THE COMPTROLLER

I am happy to provide the people of Dutchess County with the third Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) (now named the People's Annual Financial Report) for the year ending December 31, 2024. The People's Annual Financial Report is a cornerstone of our ongoing efforts to increase the transparency and accessibility of information about Dutchess County.

This report does more than share details of Dutchess County's financial performance in 2024. It's a broader profile of the County: Who we are, where we live and work, our history, economy, and government. As with the first two PAFRs, we also selected special topics we thought may be of interest to the people. For 2024, we selected Heritage Financial Park in Fishkill and public transit.

While previous PAFRs have utilized the Dutchess County Annual Financial Report (AFR) issued by the Dutchess County Commissioner of Finance, this year's was able to refer to the County's Audited Financial Statements (AUD), provided by the County's outside auditing team for the year ending 2024. The financial summaries are intended to give the reader a simplified overview of the County's revenue, expenditure, and financial position. The PAFR condenses and simplifies the Audited Financial Statements and is not intended to replace either the AFR or AUD. Individuals seeking to read the financial statements in full should refer to the AFR and/or AUD on the County's website.

We have renamed this annual report to reflect that this information belongs to the people. All of the information that the Comptroller's Office touches is a public good, meaning it belongs to you.


The impressive Hudson River is actually a tidal estuary, an arm of the sea where salty sea water meets fresh water running off the land.

Native tribes named the river Mahicantuck which loosely means "river that flows two ways." In 1664 the river was given the name of Henry Hudson, an Englishman who had captained a Dutch ship in 1609 in search of the fabled Northwest Passage.

DID YOU KNOW?

Until 1713, **Dutchess** was administered by **Ulster County**. On October 23, 1713, Queen Anne gave permission for **Dutchess County** to elect its own officers from among their own population, including a supervisor, tax collector, tax assessor and treasurer.


A major route on the Underground Railroad, the Hudson Valley served as a hub for escaped slaves from Southern states.


THE CASE OF JOHN BOLDING

An escaped slave who settled in Poughkeepsie, John Bolding was kidnapped under the "legal" bounds of the Fugitive Slave Act, which allowed escaped slaves to be returned to their owners. Many members of the Dutchess County Anti-Slavery Society raised the modern equivalent of \$2,000 and bought Mr. Bolding's freedom. He lived in Poughkeepsie for 25 years until his death in 1876.





Sales tax collections in Dutchess County totaled **\$263.7 million** in 2024, up **4%**, or \$10.1 million compared to 2023. Of the \$621 million in budgeted revenue for

2024, sales tax comprised 42% of the total income received by Dutchess County.


Dutchess County has secured an AA+ bond rating* from S&P's Global Ratings for the past 10 vears.

*Bond ratings are needed before issuing municipal bonds by a government. Ratings are independent scores from D to AAA, issued as an opinion about the County's ability and willingness to meet their financial obligations on time and in full based on specific metrics like liquidity and debt ratio.


F U N D BALANCE

LIABILITIES

- Nearly 38% of the current \$25.2 million debt service payment is related to the JTC ("Jail") capital project.
- Current outstanding debt represents 10.9% of the constitutional debt limit of \$2.8 billion
- The historically low amount attributed to "Contracts Payable" is primarily due to the completion of the JTC ("Jail") capital project.



Fund balance is the difference \$104.3 MILLION between the County's assets and liabilities at a single point in time. General fund unassigned fund balance

IN UNASSIGNED FUNDS **YEAR-END 2024** can be considered "reserves" and is the measure used when looking at the County's ability to adjust to economic changes. The increase in fund balance over the past few years has been largely attributable to the increase in sales tax collections.



2024 EXPENDITURES EXPLAINED

- The majority of the increase in "Employee Benefits" is due to the retirement pension system (+18%), as well as the rising cost of health insurance (+8%).
- New York State requires counties to contribute to the state Medicaid program. In 2024, Dutchess County paid **\$43,224,519** into Medicaid, a 20% increase over 2023.
- "Debt Service" payments increased by \$3.7 million total, with a \$2.9 million increase in principal payments, and \$0.8 million in interest payments.







2024 REVENUES EXPLAINED

- ★ 2024 Federal and State
 funding represented a quarter
 (30%) of total County
 revenues—up \$32 million
 from 2023 due to an increase
 in reimbursements for
 mandated service costs.
- Dutchess County collects more than 3 times as much in sales tax as property tax.
- *Miscellaneous Revenues" increased by **372%** due to an **\$8.1 million** increase in refunds of prior year expenditures and a **\$2.7** us million increase in opioid settlement proceeds.







Heritage Financial Park, formerly Dutchess Stadium, is primarily used as the minor league baseball home of the Hudson Valley Renegades. The facility began operations in 1994 and is situated on approximately 33+ acres of land now owned by Dutchess County.

The stadium is part of the County's Park system and is under the auspices of the Department of Public Works.





NY Waterway and the MTA began operating the Beacon-to-Newburgh ferry in 2005. The ferry ran for officials have decried the permanent 20 years until it was recently suspended in January 2025 due to "significant damage" to Beacon's ferry dock. Ferry operation has since been permanently suspended due to "declining ridership," according

to the MTA.

Local community members and elected suspension, citing traffic congestion on the Newburgh-Beacon bridge and at the Beacon train station.

NYS Assemblyman Jonathan Jacobson noted that the \$2.1 million operating budget for the ferry is .01% of the MTA's overall budget. As of the publishing of this report, discussions to resume ferry service are ongoing. SOURCE wame.org


