Workforce focus

BUILDING PARTNERSHIPS FOR WORKFORCE SOLUTIONS

Healthcare & Social Assistance is among one of the fastest growing industries in the nation, and Dutchess County is no exception. It encompasses hospitals, out-patient clinics, nursing homes, rehabilitation facilities, and independent practices. In 2013 18,433 people or 17% of Dutchess County's workforce were employed in healthcare, which is a 3% increase since 2006.

Dutchess County is fortunate that Healthcare is as strong as it is. It's not only a significant economic generator for the county it

also offers significant employment opportunities. Data provided from the New York State Department of Labor (NYSDOL) shows that in Dutchess County the percent of Healthcare & Social Assistance reporting units between 2006 and 2013 grew 4.33% from 808 to 843. **In the same time period, the percent of average employment grew by 10% or 1,616 jobs.**

The annual average wage for the industry is \$47,344 just slightly lower than the \$49,407 average wage across all industries in Dutchess County but this is a 26% increase since 2006. It is predicted that the industry will continue to expand at the national, state and local level.

Expansion means that employers will continue to need a pool of qualified workers who can quickly and effectively train to fill positions high level and entry level positions. This includes the need for direct and indirect patient care professionals; as well as the broad range of employees who have IT, Marketing, Accounting and Technical skills plus all the additional ancillary staff required to keep these facilities running smoothly.

Industry Spotlight: Healthcare

While there are a mix of jobs in the industry with some very high paying occupations and some relatively low-paying, healthcare does have **multiple**

points of entry for anyone interested in pursuing a career in healthcare. This allows for custom career ladders to be developed to fit individuals' talent, aspirations and employment goals.

Healthcare positions on the DCWIB's demand occupation list include Physical Therapists, Dental Hygienists, Emergency Medical Technicians & Paramedics as well as Home Health Aides, Dental Assistants, Medical Assistants and Personal Care Aides. According to O*Net Online, all of these occupations have "Very Favorable" growth rates in the state through 2020. *(continued on page 2)*

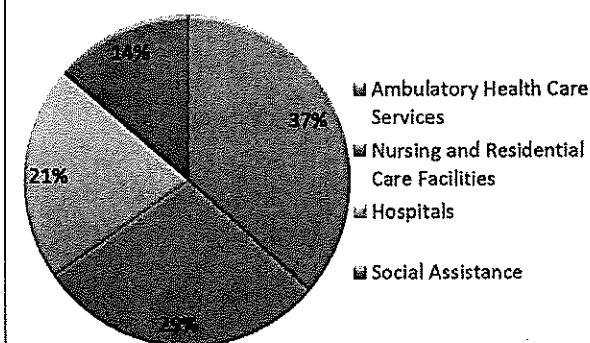

the employees. Employment at the 112 (13.29%) Nursing and Residential reporting units represents 29% of the industry total, and has an average annual wage of \$32,445. The 194 (23%) Social Assistance reporting units employs 14% of the industry's workforce and has an annual wage of \$24,634, the lowest of all of the sub-sectors.

2013 Average Employment in Dutchess County: Health Care and Social Assistance



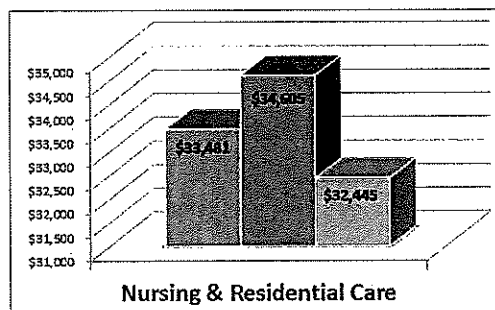
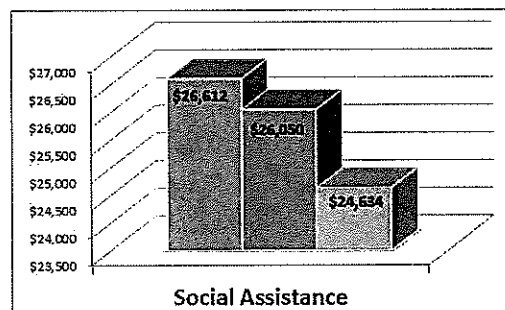
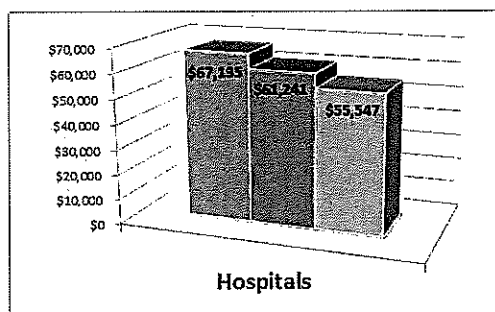
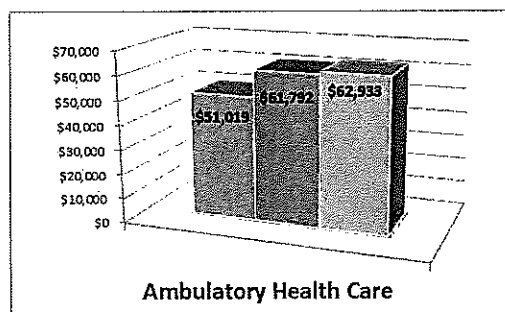
Ambulatory Health Care Services has 63.35% of the employers and 37% of the employees in the industry. It also has the highest average annual wage \$62,933. Hospitals in the County have the next highest annual average wage (\$55,547), the fewest number of employers (.36% of the whole) and 21% of

Healthcare is an industry that relies on highly skilled professionals as well as talented entry-level workers who can demonstrate strong work readiness skills. There are a variety of occupations which are projected to grow over the next several years and all require similar soft and transferable skills such as critical thinking, social perceptiveness, active listening, service orientation, reading comprehension and deductive and inductive reasoning.

Although Healthcare & Social Assistance occupations will not be for everyone, anyone looking for a career in a service-based industry may find the perfect one in this growing industry.

Dutchess County Department of Community & Family Services awarded \$314,000 to DCWIB to administer the annual Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP). Running from June 20th – September 30th youth between the ages of 14 and 20 will be hired by one of 10 local agencies.

A competitive process has determined that the programs run by Children's Media Project, Cornell Cooperative Extension, Dutchess ARC, Dutchess County Regional Chamber of Commerce, Family Services Inc., Hudson River Housing, Mill Street Loft, North East Community Center R.E.A.L. Skills Network and Youth Soft Skills Empowerment will receive SYEP funds to collectively hire 128 youth.

The youth will be placed at a variety of private, not-for-profit and public employers with diverse opportunities. Some of the positions include television and radio segment design and development, planting, harvesting and selling produce, and construction opportunities while others will spend the summer as a camp counselor, shadowing professionals in the community or working for local entrepreneurs. All participants will earn minimum wage and work about 100-150 hours during the entire program period.

DCWIB is continuing its partnership with Junior Achievement (JA) of the Hudson Valley to deliver the educational component. A Dutchess One Stop Career Center professional will utilize JA's high school program "Career Success" to bring the On-the-Job Training (OJT) component to program participants. This program covers five key topics:

1. 4Cs: critical thinking, communication, collaboration, and creativity
2. Strong soft skills
3. Work priorities
4. STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Math) and other high-growth industries
5. Personal-brand and job-hunting tools—resumes, cover letters, interviews, and digital profiles

The educational component will introduce program participants to employer expectations and provide them with the opportunity to enhance their self-confidence, articulate their transferable skills as they

apply to entry level jobs and learn about various career paths and career clusters.

Some of the questions they will be able to answer at the conclusion of the program will be: "What do I need to know to find, get, and keep a job," as well as

"What should I do when I graduate from high school?" "What choices are out there, how do my skills, interests, and values match with available careers?"

On July 8th the DCWIB will host the opening ceremony celebration for the 2014 SYEP at the Poughkeepsie Grand Hotel.

The celebration will include an

interactive keynote address by Joakim Lartey, African Story Teller, Musician and Youth Advocate. He is currently the Coordinator of Supportive Learning Environments and Positive Youth Development at Ulster County BOCES.

DCWIB works closely with Department of Family and Community Services to continue to make the program more relevant in today's employment environment and give youth the skills needed to meet national standards of job readiness.

Entry level jobs for 14-21 year olds are critical. They offer much more than a source of revenue such as exposure to: careers, workplace expectations, mentors, future references, personal likes and dislikes and of course valuable hard and soft skills.

When a youth wants to work but can't they miss out on experience, growth and earning potential. They may also feel an assortment of negative feelings including depression, frustration and anxiety. Anecdotally, employers report increasing dissatisfaction with this applicant pool citing a lack of soft skills. As a result, it is getting harder for 14-21 year olds to find entry level work. **According to the United States Census Bureau American Fact Finder data the unemployment rate for 16-19 year olds in Dutchess County is about 25%.**

Fortunately Dutchess County has an abundance of impressive youth programs and a dedicated group of professionals who tirelessly work to help their participants find personal motivation and strength to overcome any obstacles in their path in order to pursue their passion.

The total number of Dutchess County residents at work in 2010 compared to 2000 increased by almost 10,000 people and 67.5% of the total 138,358 people worked within the county. The American Community Survey (ACS) reports that In 2010 there were 7,423 establishments, *not including most government employees, railroad employees, and self-employed persons*; 5,869 of them, or **79% had 9 or fewer employees**, 18% had 10-49 employees, 3% had 50-249 employees and less than 1% had 250 or more employees.

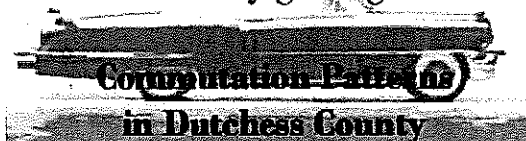
According to the 2012 ACS the average commuting time for Dutchess County residents is 31 minutes an increase of just one minute in the past 10 years. 76.7% of the employees drove themselves to work, another 8.3% carpooled while 5% of the population used public transportation while others walked or biked.

In the same time period the number of **residents reporting that they work from home and don't have any commute increased by 42% or 3,000 people**. Whether this suggests that employees are seeking the greater flexibility of a nontraditional workday or that employers are seeking the greater flexibility of a nontraditional workforce is unknown.

From Here To There

When discussing commuter patterns, conventional wisdom has been that in and out commuter populations cluster around the Hudson River bridges and that most commuters travel to New York City for work. In reviewing the commuting patterns of our workforce, the "bridge bubbles" are present, but the influence of New York City is surprisingly small. Westchester County still accounts for 1/3 of the out-commute population. The tables show where residents are working and which County's residents are working in Dutchess County. Although the patterns are relatively unchanged since 2000 the net out commutation has increased from 14,083 to 18,400.

They will continue to present the customary workshops, such as **Interviewing Skills, Cover Letters, and Resume Guidelines**, but are excited to introduce their newest workshop, **Pathways to Career Development**.

In the spirit of guiding customers along the most efficient and effective path towards their employment goals, career counselors have developed this instructional new workshop. The goal of this workshop is to help customers develop their own personal roadmap for career development and success. The Pathways to Career Development will focus not only on helping customers realize the importance of self-exploration during their job search, but also offer a clear understanding of how best to utilize all of the resources offered at Dutchess One Stop Career Center.

Congratulations to the Youth One Stop (YOS), run by the Dutchess County Chamber of Commerce for enrolling 97 youth in their first year of programming! They have a total caseload of over 100 youth and that is expected to grow in year two as they strive to enroll at least another 75 youth from around the county.

Running the Workforce Investment Act's primary youth program is not a small undertaking, federal guidelines make sure of that, but **The Workforce Development Center at the Chamber has embraced a vision and in one year has made tremendous strides to turn that vision into reality.**

In a short period of time they have created a program that offers structure and fun in order to achieve outcomes. As with many federal job training

Additionally, In an effort to provide more customer support in the resource room based on the most

frequently asked questions, the Career Center will begin mini-computer modules focused on job search activities such as how to set up an email account, how to attach a

resume to an email and how to apply to an online application. They will be one hour sessions, with a brief presentation followed by hands-on instruction.

Looking ahead to September, there will be another session of the Job Club beginning. **Job Club is run in partnership with Adriance Memorial library** at the library. The spring session saw great results with six of its original thirteen members already gainfully employed! The club members continue to meet on a weekly basis at the library.

Weather it's the workshops, computer modules or job club we are looking forward to leading our customers down a constructive and favorable career path!

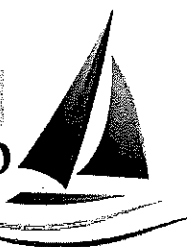



Public Works Inventory

Stored Materials and Items with a value of less than \$3,000

Contents

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Comptroller's Summary

Opportunities exist to improve recordkeeping and control over inventories which would increase efficiency and accountability of county funds and property. Policies and procedures should be drafted and implemented to control the purchase and inventory of stored materials with special consideration given to needs and risk assessments. Oversight and monitoring should be increased and evidenced to safeguard county property.

Scope, Objective and Methodology

An audit of the policies, procedures and controls of the 'Stored materials', and Assets with a value of less than \$3,000, excluding expendable supplies, was conducted to review management's controls for accountability, efficiency and safeguarding of county property. The Public Works Department is primarily responsible for all County buildings, roads, bridges, parks and the County Airport and the respective maintenance of county property.

'Stored materials' as defined for this review included: Items purchased in bulk for construction projects such as lumber, shingles, lighting, tiles; Items saved for reuse such as fencing; Items purchased for safety projects that were not installed such as a metal detector and associated equipment. Project costs can range from hundreds to thousands of dollar or more.

Assets with a value of less than \$3,000 include: radio equipment, power tools, hand tools and other items deemed high risk. The total value of items is estimated to be several hundred thousand dollars.

Our audit test work was limited to information provided by each division and their respective work areas. This audit, and its conclusions, is based on information provided through interviews, financial records, physical inventory sampling and review of the operating procedures in place during the last quarter of 2013.

General Findings and Recommendations

Assets with a value of less than \$3,000

- The Dutchess County asset management policy includes a statement that high risk assets with a value of less than \$3,000 are required to have a tracking and recording system. These assets include radio equipment, power tools and other tools deemed high risk. The divisions do not maintain a centralized accounting system or a periodic written requirement to inventory all 'high risk' items with a value of less than \$3,000. As a result, we recommend procedures be written and implemented by DPW to track items in accordance with the Dutchess County asset management policy. Procedures should include when inventories are to be conducted, how they will be documented, follow up for missing and obsolete items, and details on who will provide ongoing supervision and oversight to ensure policies are followed and items are accounted for. In addition, risk assessments should be conducted to ensure items are stored and disposed of, when necessary, in a safe and timely manner.

Stored Materials

- There are no written policies and procedures for stored materials. There was no centralized accounting record for 'stored materials' such as roofing materials, ceiling tiles, lumber, fencing and stone items. In most cases, items were purchased for projects that did not materialize in a timely fashion. There was no evidence that 'stored materials' were periodically reviewed for necessity and possible obsolescence. As a result, we recommend procedures be written and implemented to include the periodic review of all inventories and stored materials including review for necessity and disposition. Oversight and monitoring should be evidenced to provide accountability and safeguarding of stored materials. In addition, procedures should be put in

place to ensure there is a deliberate and immediate need for 'stored materials'. Also, return policies should be explored and required for all purchases to ensure funds are not wasted.

- Methods should be explored to increase communication between the divisions and departments to assist in the efficient usage of materials, supplies and equipment stored.

Observations

Assets with a value of less than \$3,000

- ❖ The Auto Service Center and Highway Garage have dedicated parts rooms and storage areas and staff to maintain perpetual inventory systems that record the receipt and issuance of the majority of items. Items are recorded in a computerized 'parts' system. The other public works division areas do not maintain a central inventory receipt and issuance record.
- ❖ Lists of tools/assets with a value of less than \$3,000 were requested and obtained from the following Public Works division staff and random items were sampled for existence:
 - DPW Highway, Building Maintenance, Engineering, Airport and Auto Service Center lists were typed and physical inventory samples were performed. No discrepancies were noted.
 - Parks department lists for Wilcox, Bowdoin were typed and physical inventory samples were performed. No discrepancies were noted.
 - Aviation Division provided listings containing items located in vehicles. No discrepancies were noted.
- ❖ At the time of our original review of tires stored at Highway and Auto Center, lists were not prepared, but were completed during our audit. Both lists were added into their computerized parts inventory software.
- ❖ At the commencement of our audit the total values for parts inventories maintained at the Highway Division and Auto Center were not entered into the county financial system. This information was given to Dutchess County Finance by DPW Management for recording during our review.
- ❖ We noted a Building's employee did not have all tools available at the time of our physical review as the department had an informal policy where employees were allowed to borrow tools for personal use.
- ❖ E-911 and Dutchess County Community and Family Services have a maintenance staff person included in their respective budgets to perform day-to-day maintenance and have supply areas at their facilities. Lists of tools were provided by respective staff members at each location. A sampling of items was conducted at these locations with no discrepancies found.

Recommendations

- Management should review all storage areas and document all contents.
- A centralized accounting of assets with a value of less than \$3,000 should be maintained. *This could be as simple as maintaining an excel spreadsheet based on all of the information gathered from the various areas.*
- Periodic physical inventories should be performed by management personnel to safeguard items.
- Communication methods should be developed for the sharing of tools and equipment to minimize unnecessary costs.

- Items deemed obsolete should be disposed of either through county auction, recycling, or where other methods have been exhausted, discarded.
- The practice of borrowing of tools and equipment for personal use should be stopped and communicated to staff periodically.
- Comprehensive written policies and procedures should be developed to provide guidance to staff.
- All assets should be safeguarded.

Stored Materials

- ❖ During our physical inventory reviews, we asked about specific 'stored materials' that were found at various sites. Staff indicated stored supplies were comprised of items that had been purchased for specific projects by administrative staff; however, in most cases the projects were put on hold. We reviewed the records for several projects associated with the stored materials and found this to be true.
- ❖ A sampling of 'stored materials' found at various locations follow:

Additional Comments

- o Staff indicated that 'used' items were kept for re-use. For example, old ceiling tiles are stored at the County Office Building. Tiles are obsolete and some ceilings have not been renovated in the past 30 years.
- o Staff indicated some items have become obsolete to the department. For example, ammonia used for cleaning was purchased in bulk by Parks but is no longer used.
- o Supplies were ordered for jobs but the project was put on hold such as roofing materials and the security items.

- While conducting our review, a monitor that was part of the 'stored' security equipment was determined to be missing. A police report was filed by the department as a result of the theft.
- Staff indicated some items are stored, forgotten and were realized during our audit review.
- Additional supplies maintained on hand, but not noted above were deemed necessary for daily operations.

Recommendations

- Management should review all storage areas and document all contents and prepare a centralized accounting of 'stored materials'. This could be as simple as maintaining an excel spreadsheet based on all of the information gathered from the various areas.
 - Periodic physical inventories should be performed by management personnel to safeguard items.
 - Stored materials should be evaluated for use in a timely manner to prevent damage or theft.
 - Communication methods should be developed for the sharing of stored materials and equipment to minimize unnecessary costs and storage.
 - Items deemed obsolete should be disposed of either through county auction, recycling or where other methods have been exhausted, discarded.
 - Comprehensive written policies and procedures should be developed to provide guidance to staff.
 - All assets should be safeguarded.

Dear Comptroller Coughlan:

In order to provide the diverse services offered by the Department of Public Works, it is necessary to maintain a sizeable inventory of expendable supplies, tools, equipment, and construction materials. In addition, the Department has a large inventory of repair parts for automobiles, machinery, construction equipment, HVAC systems, and buildings. The Department operates and provides services from numerous locations throughout the County. DPW operations are conducted from five Highway Outpost facilities in Beekman, Amenia, Millbrook, Pine Plains and Rhinebeck; the Main Highway Garage in Poughkeepsie; the County Office Building on Market Street; Bowdoin Park in Poughkeepsie; Wilcox Park in Milan; Quiet Cove Park in Hyde Park; Dutchess County Airport in Wappinger; and the Auto Service Center in Hyde Park. At each location an inventory is maintained. Only two facilities have staff dedicated to inventory management; the Auto Service Center and the Main Highway Garage. As your audit report identified, the Department has room to improve inventory management in order to increase efficiency and accountability.

The Department is aware that there are currently no written procedures concerning inventory management for all of the DPW Divisions and work locations. As there is no dedicated inventory management staff at most locations, it will be challenging to develop a uniform written procedure for inventory control, however the Department is going to establish guidelines for inventory management. Within the guideline, physical inventories will be prescribed and a centralized recording system will be developed. Guidance will include proper asset disposal procedures and recording of disposed assets. The goal is to establish this guideline by January 01, 2015.

Thank you for the opportunity to offer this response to the 2014 Public Works' Audit Report.

AUDIT REPORT

Dutchess County Soil and Water Conservation District
January 1, 2013 – December 31, 2013

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Comptroller's Summary

Soil and Water continues to struggle with complying fully with the required accrual accounting method and also the oversight and monitoring of the agency's cash flow which is affecting their fiscal stability. While conducting our annual review, the Executive Director and the District Secretary who were both responsible for the accounting records retired in 2014. The District Secretary did maintain a part-time presence to make corrections and assist with the audit completion.

Organization and Background

The Dutchess County Soil and Water Conservation District (DCSW) was established in 1945. The DCSW was authorized by State statute, as a quasi government agency set up to coordinate state and federal conservation programs at the local level. The district provides education and technical assistance on managing soil, water and related natural resources to municipalities, farmers, business owners and homeowners. Additional information is available on the Dutchess County Soil and Water's website: www.dutchessswcd.org.

Audit Scope, Objective and Methodology

An audit was conducted of the Dutchess County Soil and Water Conservation District for the period of January 1, 2013 through December 31, 2013. During the audited period, Dutchess County appropriated \$235,000 to DCSW. The Dutchess County Department of Planning and Development is responsible for the distribution and oversight of these funds.

The audit included a review of:

- The Annual Report of the Treasurer to New York State
- Policies and Procedures, Cash Handling
- Claiming documents, payroll records including W2's and tax documents
- Selected expenditures and receipts

Summary of Findings

- ❖ Entries recording accruals and reversals were not incorporated in DCSW records during 2013 resulting in delays in finalizing 2013 financial statements.
- ❖ Fees were incurred on late payments for the NYS retirement costs; the retirement invoice for 2012 was paid in 2013. The 2013 retirement invoice had not been paid as of the due date February 1, 2014, incurring 7.5% in late charges.

Financial Reporting

The 2013 DCSW Annual Report of the Treasurer to New York State is the required document detailing DCSW's consolidated financial information.

Revenues reported in 2013 totaled \$749,146.36 and expenses totaled \$779,108.56. The Statement of Income and Expenses is shown as Exhibit I. The Summary of Changes in Fund Balance and the Operating Fund Balance Sheet as reported by Soil and Water for the time period ending 12/31/13 is attached as Exhibit II.

Finding:

There were numerous errors in the posting of revenue and expenditures that required correction to become compliant with the accrual method of accounting which were corrected during our review. The beginning fund balance for 2013 was not the ending fund balance from 2012. The books were not formally closed and entries to 2012 would cause the ending fund balance to change after last year's reporting. The beginning fund balance for 2013 was \$880 higher. We were unable to ascertain where the change occurred.

Recommendation:

Oversight and monitoring of the agency's financial records must be increased by the Board to ensure monthly financials are based on accurate postings.

County Appropriation

The Dutchess County Soil and Water Appropriation for 2013 was \$235,000.00. Claims made to Dutchess County were for personal services and fringe benefits for the following programs:

Account Review

Personnel Expenses, Retirement Bill and Cash flow

- Employee wages for 2013 W2's/W3 amounted to \$429,066.67; ten employees and two interns were included in the total. Federal and State payroll tax remittances were reviewed for accuracy and timeliness in submittal.
- The district pays for employee health insurance costs at 100% for single coverage and for other plans the single rate plus 50% of the difference between the single plan and the plan of choice. A health insurance buy-out is also offered; in 2013 the Board approved to reimburse those individuals who selected the health insurance buyout 62% for 2013. A total of \$18,308.72 was paid for 2013 employee buyouts for two individuals. Buyout payments were added as income in the respective W2's.

Findings:

- The 2012-2013 NYS Retirement annual payment (due February 1, 2013) assessed for \$66,806 was paid partially on February 13, 2013 and March 11, 2013, and incurred penalty fee payments totaling \$525.81 bringing the total cost paid in 2013 to \$67,331.81.
 - The 2013-2014 NYS retirement invoice of \$104,868 was due by December 15, 2013; if not paid \$105,812 was due by February 1, 2014. The invoice had not been paid as of our initial review; the total expense was entered as a 2013 Accounts Payable.
 - Per NYS Retirement "A penalty of 7.5% in delinquency interest" was accruing to the \$105,812 for the missed 2014 deadline and will continue until all payments are made.

NOTE: The agency indicated cash flow issues have predicated the delayed payments for 2012 and 2013 and will continue in 2014.

Recommendations:

- While partial payments have been made to NYS, the continuation of the delayed payments incurs interest penalties as well as continued cash flow issues. In addition, it places the agency in a precarious financial situation.
- The retirement expense is a direct cost and should be paid prior to incurring discretionary costs and increasing personnel costs. **Cash flow issues must be addressed.** Based on our observations the following areas should be reviewed:
 - 1) Travel expenses which were recorded as \$17,900 for 2013.
 - 2) The reduction in personnel costs.
 - 3) The tracking of revenue sources such as grants to the expenditures for specific grants. There were no spreadsheets showing the tracking of each grant to expenses to assist in cash flow monitoring. Grants have various terms which may extend to multiple years.

Maintenance Fee

Soil and Water has an agreement with Cornell Cooperative Extension of Dutchess County to share expenses for maintenance of the Farm and Home Center Building; in 2013 the maintenance fee totaled \$4,797.53.

Fixed Asset Inventory/Equipment

In 2013, the inventory worksheet attached to the NYS Annual Report of the Treasurer contained fifteen (15) items for a total value of \$92,292.38; which included vehicles, a copier, a projector, computer equipment, a GPS data logger and a Hydroseeder, which was purchased in July 2013 for \$32,276.25.

Inventory for Resale

According to agency records, expenditures totaled \$19,129.01 in 2013. Sales recorded for 2013 were \$26,013.90.

Finding:

- The Tree/Plant sales and order inventories are not reconciled. Preorders, orders and receipts are separately maintained by three individual employees. The purchases are not reconciled to a subsequent inventory and sale summary. There is no accountability for product and funds when reconciliations are not performed.

Recommendation:

- The receipts and inventory of tree/plant orders should be reconciled to ensure the accuracy of revenues received and expenditures incurred and to account for all items purchased and disbursed, as well as loss. All discrepancies should be promptly investigated and resolved. Any additional costs incurred for the Tree/Plant sale should be recorded and included in a simple profit and loss statement to properly account for this event.

IRS Form 1099 Misc

The IRS requires payments of \$600 or more to vendors be reported on IRS Form 1099 Misc. One 1099 was issued in 2013. To obtain information for 1099 filings, a Federal W-9 "Request for Taxpayer Identification Number and Certification" form should be collected from individuals and businesses who receive monies from DCSW.

Finding:

- DCSW did not require W-9's from all vendors.

Recommendation:

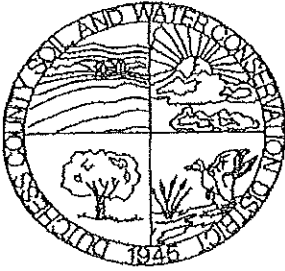
- DCSW should request a Federal W-9 form from each vendor prior to payment.

WHEREAS, on December 18th, 2013, Governor Andrew Cuomo signed into law, Bill S01199, an act to amend the real property tax law, in relation to authorizing certain exemptions from school district real property tax for veterans; and

WHEREAS, this amendment to the real property tax law allows for School Districts to extend a real property tax exemption for School Taxes to Veterans in their respective districts; and

WHEREAS, this amendment places the responsibility for enacting any Veterans real property tax exemption for School Taxes onto the respective districts' school boards; and

WHEREAS, this amendment does not specify an entity fiscally liable for the potential tax burden created upon any School District's enactment of such resolution allowable by this amendment; and

WHEREAS, Greene County School Districts have presumed from the language of this amendment that any additional tax burden must be absorbed by the School Districts, or shifted to the non-Veteran real property owners of the respective School Districts; and

WHEREAS, this additional tax burden has been rejected by all but two School Districts in Greene County; thereby, denying Veterans of this benefit; and

WHEREAS, Governor Andrew Cuomo and the numerous New York State Senatorial sponsor and co-sponsors of Bill S01199 publicly stated their desire and intent in enacting this bill for the benefit of New York State Military Veterans; and

WHEREAS, RPTL Section 458, enacted before the year 1896, and subsequent amendments until now, includes General Municipal Taxes unless disallowed by local option;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Greene County Legislature hereby calls upon Governor Andrew Cuomo and the New York State Senate to enact further legislation removing the burden of mandating this exemption from the individual School Districts, and release the School Districts including the non-Veteran real property owners, from any tax burden imposed, when School Districts provide this benefit to Veterans as per the New York State Real Property Tax Law Veterans Tax Exemption; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Greene County Legislature hereby calls upon Governor Andrew Cuomo and the New York State Senate to enact legislation ensuring that New York State will immediately and forever reimburse each School District the definitive

I am pleased to announce the availability of the Round 13 Request for Proposals (RFP) to solicit State assistance payments for Farmland Protection Implementation Projects. Eligible applicants include counties with State approved agricultural and farmland protection plans; municipalities that have adopted a local farmland protection plan; soil and water conservation districts; and not-for-profit conservation organizations (referred to as "land trusts").

The extent of State assistance available for the protection of farmland through the purchase or lease of development rights will now represent a range of options designed to offer improved flexibility to applicants and landowners depending on their specific needs. Most notably is the new maximum cost share rate of 87.5% of total project costs when a **landowner provides all of the required local match**. Please see the full RFP proposal for specific requirements for this and other offered rates of assistance.

In addition to a higher State cost-share rate and more eligible applicants, other noteworthy changes to this funding opportunity include:

- successful applicants will be required to submit fewer documents for Department review and approval;

- a more stream-lined review process at the Department;
- establishment of performance-based milestones during the course of the State contract to help ensure that most projects will be completed within two years;
- more interim payments over the course of the State contract period rather than one lump-sum payment to help lessen the financial burden on local project partners and participating landowners with transaction costs; and
- the introduction of an incentive payment agreement as an eligible project to enable the local sponsor to strategically protect an at-risk farm for several years so as to afford themselves the time necessary to acquire a perpetual conservation easement.

**A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING NECESSARY REFORMS TO NEW YORK LABOR
LAW §240 AND §241**

WHEREAS, New York Labor Law §240 and §241, commonly known as the "Scaffold Law," outlines liability for injuries caused by an employee's fall from a height; and

WHEREAS, the laws impose strict liability on employers and owners of buildings if a worker falls from any height; and

WHEREAS, the law was first imposed in 1885 at a time when worker safety was largely neglected in New York State and at a time when modern safety equipment and scaffolding techniques did not exist; and

WHEREAS, the Scaffold Law has caused a dramatic increase in construction costs due to increased insurance required for employers in the construction business, causing New York State to have the highest general liability insurance costs in the nation; and


WHEREAS, the Scaffold Law is a boon to personal injury lawyers as half of the 30 largest law suits in the state stem from Scaffold Law issues and while scaffold related injuries have decreased in the past 20 years the number of Scaffold Law claims has increased 500 percent; and

WHEREAS, New York is the only state in the country to impose a construction law like the Scaffold law that imposes strict liability on the employer; further it is one of a very few laws that mandate strict liability in the State of New York; and

WHEREAS, the increase in costs in New York drives away investment in our infrastructure when developers and contractors can get better rates in other states; and

WHEREAS, not only does the law drive away out-of-state investment in infrastructure

WHEREAS, this was based off statistics on construction injuries in Illinois that show a decrease in work related injuries since the 1995 repeal of its Scaffold Law at a much quicker pace than here in New York, and

WHEREAS, following the removal of the Illinois Scaffold Law, the state also found an increase in the number of construction jobs created on an annual basis; and


WHEREAS, comparative negligence standards would help maintain worker safety while decreasing some of the insurance costs related to implementation of the current Scaffold Law; and

WHEREAS, this negligence standard under the Scaffold Law would not ban recovery for an injured worker due to their own negligence, but would allow the employer to bring issues with employee culpability to mitigate the damages in cases where the worker's actions contributed to his or her injury; and

WHEREAS, federal regulations have been enacted that attempt to protect workers from injury to falls by requiring certain precautions to be in place for people working at height and allows an outlet for workers concerned about their safety to engage federal review of any worksite for compliance with these regulations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Yates County Legislature is strongly in support of Scaffold Law reform as well as meaningful protection of construction workers; and be it further







The Dutchess County Department of Mental Hygiene is requesting to use current year funds to pay for prior year expenses for court ordered incarcerations (court remands). The invoiced claims on the attached document exceed the amount encumbered for the year by \$29,403.

In an effort to reduce court ordered inpatient admissions, especially for youth, we have begun discussions with the Office of Mental Health's Hudson River Field Office, to learn of different techniques, tactics, and practices that have been used in other localities to control and reduce the costs for court ordered incarcerations. We will evaluate these options for their applicability to Dutchess County, and then we will discuss them with various courts in an effort to reduce our costs on an ongoing basis.

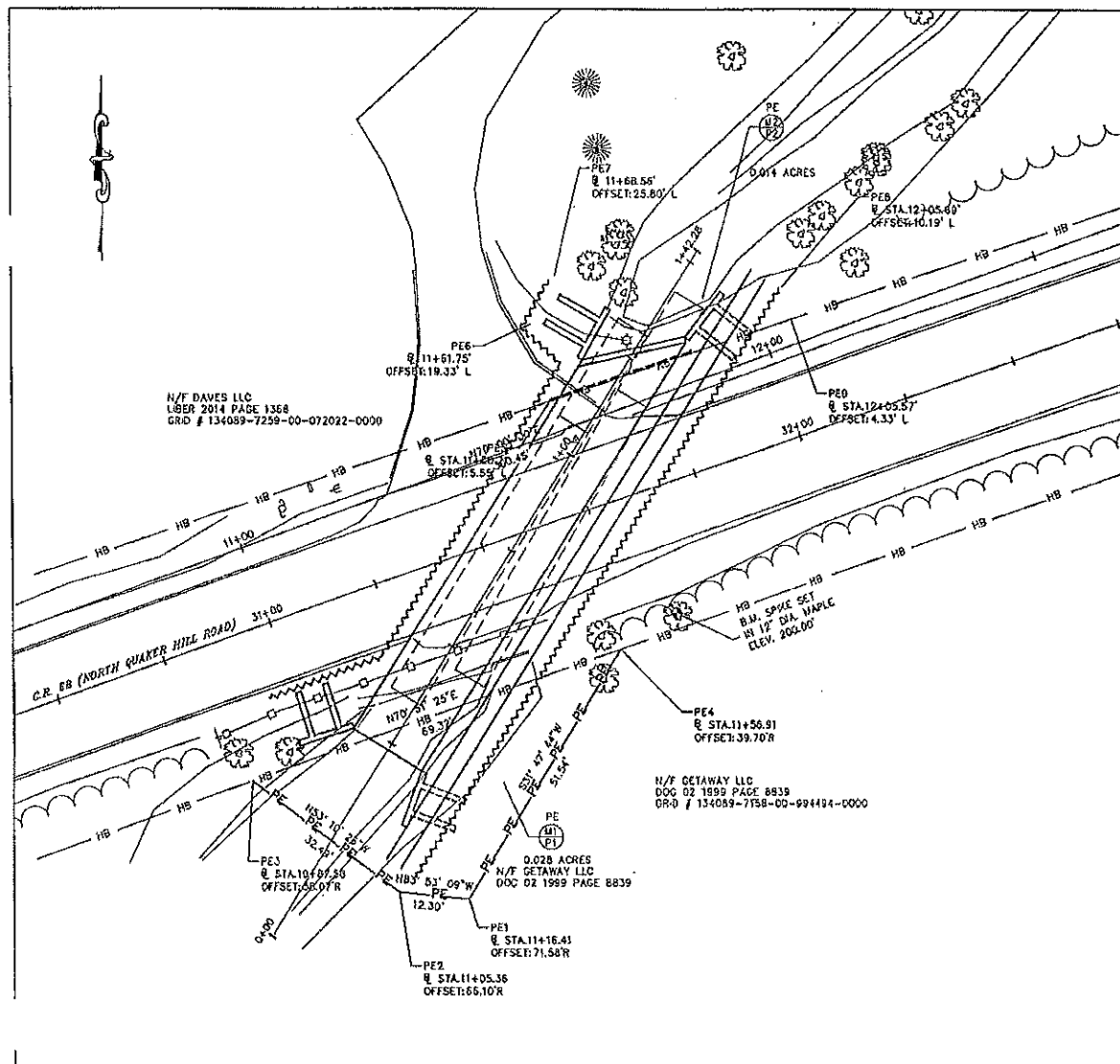

**AGREEMENT TO PURCHASE REAL PROPERTY
(FEE ACQUISITION)**

This Agreement by and between POUGHKEEPSIE BRANCH LLC., hereinafter referred to as the "Seller", and the COUNTY OF DUTCHESS, hereinafter referred to as the "Buyer", pertains to that portion of real property interest required for public right of way purposes only.

1. **PROPERTY DESCRIPTION.** The Seller agrees to sell, grant, convey all right, title and interest to a 845.49± Square Meter (9100.81± Square Foot) parcel located on the West Side of CR 21, Noxon Road, in the Town of LaGrange, Dutchess County, New York, further described as:

Being a portion of those same lands described in a deed dated December 11, 2009, and recorded on December 30, 2009 as Document #0220097056 in the Office of the County Clerk for Dutchess County, New York with the address 122 Noxon Road (Re. Tax map No. 133400-6260-02-988992-0000), and being the same lands designated as Map 22, Parcel 36 on exhibit "A" attached here to.

2. **IMPROVEMENTS INCLUDED IN THE PURCHASE.** The following improvements, if any, now in or on the property are included in this Agreement: Removal of 8,666.73 sf of grass, 709.03 sf of driveway material, (1) 10" diameter tree, (1) 15" diameter tree and (2) 6'x6' bushes.
3. **PURCHASE PRICE.** The total purchase price is THIRTEEN THOUSAND Dollars (\$13,000.00). This price includes the acquisition of the above real property in fee as described in paragraph 1 and the improvements described in paragraph 2, if any.

APPENDIX 2-S IRAN DIVESTMENT ACT

As a result of the Iran Divestment Act of 2012 (Act), Chapter 1 of the 2012 Laws of New York, a new provision has been added to the State Finance Law (SFL), § 165-a, effective April 12, 2012. NYSDOT reserves the right to reject any renewal, extension or request for assignment for an entity that appears on the prohibited entities list hereafter and to pursue a responsibility review with respect to any entity that is granted a contract extension/renewal or assignment and appears on the prohibited entities list thereafter.

APPENDIX 2-S IRAN DIVESTMENT ACT

As a result of the Iran Divestment Act of 2012 (Act), Chapter 1 of the 2012 Laws of New York, a new provision has been added to the State Finance Law (SFL), § 165-a, effective April 12, 2012. Under the Act, the Commissioner of the Office of General Services (OGS) will be developing a list (prohibited entities list) of "persons" who are engaged in "investment activities in Iran" (both are defined terms in the law). Pursuant to SFL § 165-a(3)(b), the initial list is expected to be issued no later than 120 days after the Act's effective date, at which time it will be posted on the OGS website.

By entering into a renewal or extension of this Contract, Contractor (or any assignee) certifies that once the prohibited entities list is posted on the OGS website, it will not utilize on such Contract any subcontractor that is identified on the prohibited entities list.

Additionally, Contractor understands that during the term of the Contract, should NYSDOT receive information that a person is in violation of the above-referenced certification NYSDOT will offer the person an opportunity to respond. If the person fails to demonstrate that it has ceased its engagement in the investment which is in violation of the Act within 90 days after the determination of such violation, then NYSDOT shall take such action as may be appropriate including, but not limited to, imposing sanctions, seeking compliance, recovering damages, or declaring the Contractor in default.

NYSDOT reserves the right to reject any renewal, extension or request for assignment for an entity that appears on the prohibited entities list hereafter and to pursue a responsibility review with respect to any entity that is granted a contract extension/renewal or assignment and appears on the prohibited entities list thereafter.





On the morning of Friday 01/24/14 there was a leak in a piping in the geothermal vault (located below ground underneath the parking lot) at the Emergency Response Center. Propylene glycol and water mixture was overflowing the vault and running across the parking lot. A vapor mixture of water and propylene glycol had collected in the vault.

Westech International, the company who performed the original installation of the "building side" of the geothermal system, was called in on an emergency to address the leak. They repaired the leak, and replaced the lost propylene glycol/water mixture with water only (due to unknown factors as to the % of glycol required for the system and wanting not to compromise the system with the incorrect glycol-water mix), leaving the system with no freeze protection, inhibiting the system's ability to transfer heat, and therefore condition space inside the building. They also noted that the vault seemed to have been collecting ground water for quite some time, causing stalactites and stalagmites to form on the headers and gauges and making it very difficult to read the gauges and to check the operation status on the isolation and balancing valves. The condition of the valves is questionable and many might need to be replaced.

As a result, design documents are in the final stages of being developed that will be used to procure a low bid contractor to perform the following work:

1. Provide and install freeze proof concentrate propylene glycol sufficient to bring the geothermal system to the required 40% solution. Sufficient biocide and rust inhibitors shall also be installed.
2. Provide and assessment report, including a minimum of 20 color photographs, of the working conditions of, including but not limited to, all 112 temperature gauges, 112 pressure gauges, 112 triple duty valves and all other equipment contained in the geothermal vault/manhole.

3. Provide unit pricing, including parts, materials, labor, etc. for the replacement of one "assembly" in the geothermal manhole. An assembly includes all materials, components, etc. as shown in detail 2 on drawing H-701 "Base Mount Pump Detail".
4. Provide unit pricing, including parts, materials, labor, etc. for the replacement of one "partial assembly" in the geothermal manhole. A "partial assembly" includes all materials, components, etc. as shown in detail 2 on drawing H-701 "Base Mount Pump Detail" from the flexible connection upward (pump, drain, suction diffuser not included).
5. Provide a two year service/maintenance contract, including parts and labor for the Geothermal System at The Dutchess County Emergency Response Center. The service contract will also include the task of maintaining the proper propylene glycol, rust inhibitors and biocide levels in the system.

The glycol re-charge is estimated at approximately \$60,000. The replacement of valves/gauges could be as much as \$50,000, depending on how many need to be changed out. Ancillary costs are estimated at approximately \$10,000. With 20% contingency, the amount requested for necessary repairs to the geothermal heating/cooling system is **\$144,000**. (There is the chance that once detailed assessment of the valve assemblies takes place that the cost could be less. The work will be assessed carefully.)

BOND RESOLUTION DATED AUGUST 11, 2014.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE COST OF THE RECONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENT OF PARKS, IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF DUTCHESS, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$166,650, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$166,650 BONDS TO PAY THE COST THEREOF.

WHEREAS, all conditions precedent to the financing of the capital project hereinafter described, including compliance with the provision of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, have been performed; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to authorize the financing thereof, NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED, by the County Legislature of the County of Dutchess, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The reconstruction and improvement of parks, in and for the County of Dutchess, New York, including incidental expenses in connection therewith, is hereby authorized at a maximum estimated cost of \$166,650.

Section 2. It is hereby determined that the plan for the financing of said class of objects or purposes is by the issuance of the \$166,650 serial bonds hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is 15 years, pursuant to subdivision 19(c) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said County of Dutchess, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same

respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Commissioner of Finance, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. Such bonds shall be in fully registered form and shall be signed in the name of the County of Dutchess, New York, by the manual or facsimile signature of the Commissioner of Finance and a facsimile of its corporate seal shall be imprinted or impressed thereon and may be attested by the manual or facsimile signature of the County Clerk.

Section 7. The powers and duties of advertising such bonds for sale, conducting the sale and awarding the bonds, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance, who shall advertise such bonds for sale, conduct the sale, and award the bonds in such manner as she shall deem best for the interests of the County; provided, however, that in the exercise of these delegated powers, she shall comply fully with the provisions of the Local Finance Law and any order or rule of the State Comptroller applicable to the sale of municipal bonds. The receipt of the Commissioner of Finance shall be a full acquittance to the purchaser of such bonds, who shall not be obliged to see to the application of the purchase money.

Section 8. All other matters, except as provided herein relating to such bonds including determining whether to issue such bonds having substantially level or declining annual debt service and all matters related thereto, prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds (and if said bonds are to be executed in the name of the County by the facsimile signature of the Commissioner of Finance, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, denominations, maturities and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Commissioner of Finance. It is hereby determined that it is to the financial advantage of the County not to impose and collect from registered owners of such serial bonds any charges for mailing, shipping and insuring bonds transferred or exchanged by the fiscal agent, and, accordingly, pursuant to paragraph c of Section 70.00 of the Local Finance Law, no such charges shall be so collected by the fiscal agent. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals in addition to those required by section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Commissioner of Finance shall determine.

Section 9. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150 - 2. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.

Section 10. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 11. This resolution, which takes effect immediately, shall be published in full in *The Poughkeepsie Journal* and the *Southern Dutchess News*, the official newspapers of said County, together with a notice of the Clerk of the County Legislature in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

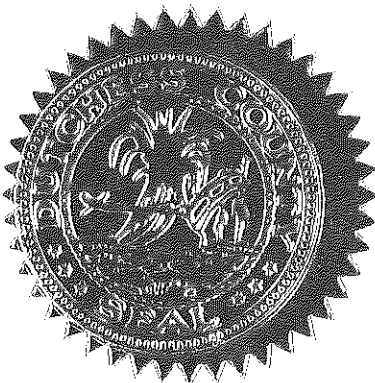



RE: Harlem Valley Rail Trail Rehabilitation

Portions of the Harlem Valley Rail Trail are in need to rehabilitation to address safety concerns which have developed due to the age of the trail. A detailed survey, review and assessment of each portion of the HVRT has been undertaken by DPW staff this Spring. As with any paved surface that has regular usage in a Northeast climate, re-paving will be required on a regular and on-going basis. In addition the normal wear and tear on outdoor wood railings and other appurtenances necessitates periodic rehabilitation of these elements.

The proposed work at the HVRT for this Fall is the following:

1. Cut all tree roots encroaching onto the trail causing the existing blacktop to buckle, crack and separate creating a dangerous tripping/falling hazard especially to bike riders and roller bladders.
2. Grind down all existing bumps and cracks on the blacktop.
3. Install new top layer of blacktop over problem areas along the trail (approximately ¾ to 1 mile of pavement is affected). Cost estimate for materials - \$60,000; labor by Highway Division of DPW.
4. Replace/install 4000 feet new Cedar Split Rail fencing at various designated spots along the trail. Cost estimate for material-\$13,000; labor by Parks Division of DPW.
5. Remove all existing Bollards on Trail and replace with raised islands at each at-grade-crossing that meet new Federally approved standards. Cost estimate for materials - \$12,000; labor by Parks Division of DPW.

Therefore DPW is requesting \$85,000 for the Rehabilitation of the HVRT.

There are some significantly poor and potentially dangerous electrical conditions at both Bowdoin and Wilcox Parks. These conditions are largely a result of age but increased electrical needs over the years.

The existing transfer station panel at Bowdoin is mounted on rotting plywood and is a safety hazard. Also the adjacent electric pole is rotted and in danger of falling down. This station feeds the entire lower section of the park, including Administration Office, Auditorium, Pavilions 1,2 and 3, band shell and all bathrooms and the Water Spray pad feature.

Electric poles at Bowdoin are from the early 1960's and need to be replaced before they fall down. The intent would be to bury the main feed line underground as we have had several trees fall and branches break off which breaks the main wire line which disrupts the entire lower park's electric power.

The sub-panel in Bowdoin Park office needs replacement as it is an old 3 phase panel and the Park has been running on a single-phase feed and every third circuit in the panel is unusable. Also several breakers in the old panel were feeding some electrical circuits in the basement that are now powered by the new sub-panel the DPW Buildings installed.

The main electrical line that feeds the entire Wilcox Park electrical system has had at least 7 separate complete breaks over the past 4 years due to falling trees and branches. This not only incapacitates the entire park, as the wells no longer function, chlorinators for the water don't work, bathrooms toilets can't flush, office can't function but the cost of repairs can be very costly as the poles are located in some highly inaccessible areas. In 2009 alone the county spent over \$5,000 on replacing poles and wire that were broken by falling trees. Also when the main line breaks, the park facilities come to a standstill which results in unhappy residents who have rented facilities that results in refunds of rental fees which is a loss of revenue. Parks staff can dig the trenches which will save a large part of the cost for

this project.

The proposed electrical upgrade work at the two Parks for this Summer/Fall is the following:

Bowdoin Park Electrical Upgrades:

- Replace 525 feet of overhead power lines that are the main feed into the park with underground cable in conduit.
- Replace existing pole and distribution panel. Pole is rotted and needs to be replaced; Current feed to Main parks building is three phase; three phase service has been discontinued in this building as it is no longer necessary. Feed to building will be changed to underground cable in conduit.
- Replace main panel in Park office (Old panel was part of Three phase service and needs to be replaced; some breakers in this panel fed the Auditorium and first floor.) New Breaker panel on first floor now feeds new Kitchen and will supply new workshop that will be constructed this fall from funds in HO 372. New single phase panel in Main office will allow additional outlets to be added which will eliminate the current use of extension cords to supply power to the existing offices.

Wilcox Park Electrical Upgrades:

- Replace main Electrical line coming into Wilcox Park with an new underground line in conduit.

Some of this work can be partially completed by parks staff - digging trenches, electrical panel work - however the running of the main lines and the installation of new poles, as necessary, must be completed by a contractor and/or the utility company. The amount of funds estimated which are needed for this electrical upgrade work is \$80,000.







REVENUE

Student Revenue

- No tuition increase.
- Estimated 3% full-time head count and part-time credit hour decline in enrollment for the fall 2014 and spring 2015 semesters as compared to 2013-14 academic year actual enrollment.
- Estimated 5% enrollment decline for summer 2015 over the 2012-13 summer actual. (2014 summer enrollment is not available).
- Overall full-time tuition decline, \$265,600, and part time tuition decline, \$469,756.
- Total tuition decline \$735,356.

College in the High School Revenue

- Revenue generated is equal to the reimbursement to districts for the cost of adjuncts and facility rental expenses.

County Contribution

- No budgeted increase in County aid.

Chargeback

- Rate increase from \$2,200 for 2013-2014 to \$2,310 for 2014-2015.
- Out-of-county enrollment for the fall 2013 and spring 2014 is expected to be 156.5 FTE's higher than budgeted. Anticipating this to continue for the 2014-15 year.
- Rate increase = \$344,000. Enrollment increase= \$176,000.
- Total increase = \$520,394.

State Aid

- Increase of \$75 per FTE to \$2,497 for 2014-2015.
- State aid budgeted FTE's is the greater of the 2013-14 actual or the weighted three year rolling average for the period 2011-2014. For 2014-15 we anticipate the three year rolling average to be the greater number at 7,322 FTE's.
- Also included in state aid is the rental aid reimbursement. This year we expect rental costs to be reimbursed at 46% which is down 4% as compared the 2013-14 budget.
- Total budgeted increase of \$403,006 is a net of the following impacts:
 - Credit/GED Enrollment decline of 150 FTE's = (\$363,300)
 - Concurrent Enrollment increase of 106 FTE's = \$256,732
 - \$75 Rate increase = \$549,150
 - Rental decline = (\$39,576)

Offset Revenue: Technology and Course fees, Nursery School and Miscellaneous Income

- Technology fee revenue is declining due to projected decreases in enrollment. Total budgeted decrease is \$162,870.
- Recommending a \$10 increase in lab fees for high cost courses, i.e., Biology, Chemistry, etc. This increase is necessary to cover the increasing cost in consumable supplies. Total budgeted increase is \$51,443.

Other Revenue: Community Services income other than GED/ESL

- Adjusted for anticipated enrollment increases.
- Budgeting an increase of \$65,000.

EXPENSES

Personnel Services

- Budgeting a .4% decrease or \$147,998.
- The budget for adjuncts has decreased due to the decrease in enrollment.
- Contractual increases have been offset by retirements that either have not been replaced or replaced by positions with lower salaries.

College in the High School Expenses

- Reimbursement of the cost for adjuncts and facility rental equal to revenues collected.

Equipment

- No budgeted changes in equipment.

Contractual

- Budgeting a 2% increase or \$218,283 for inflationary increases in academic consumable supplies, maintenance and technology contracts.

Benefits

- Budgeting a 2.2% decrease or \$301,030.
- Contributing to the decline is the College's change from Alternate PPO to Healthy Advantage for professional staff enrolled in the DEHIC medical plan. This change resulted in \$107,000 in savings to the College.
- Starting with the 2013-14 year, those individuals covered by a family plan who were pre-1997 now contribute 12.5%, resulting in additional employee contributions of \$58,000 to offset costs.
- Budgeting for a decrease in NYS ERS and TIAA CREF retirement contributions.
 - Replacement of retirees at lower salaries.
 - Replacements primarily in new Tier VI with lower contribution rates.

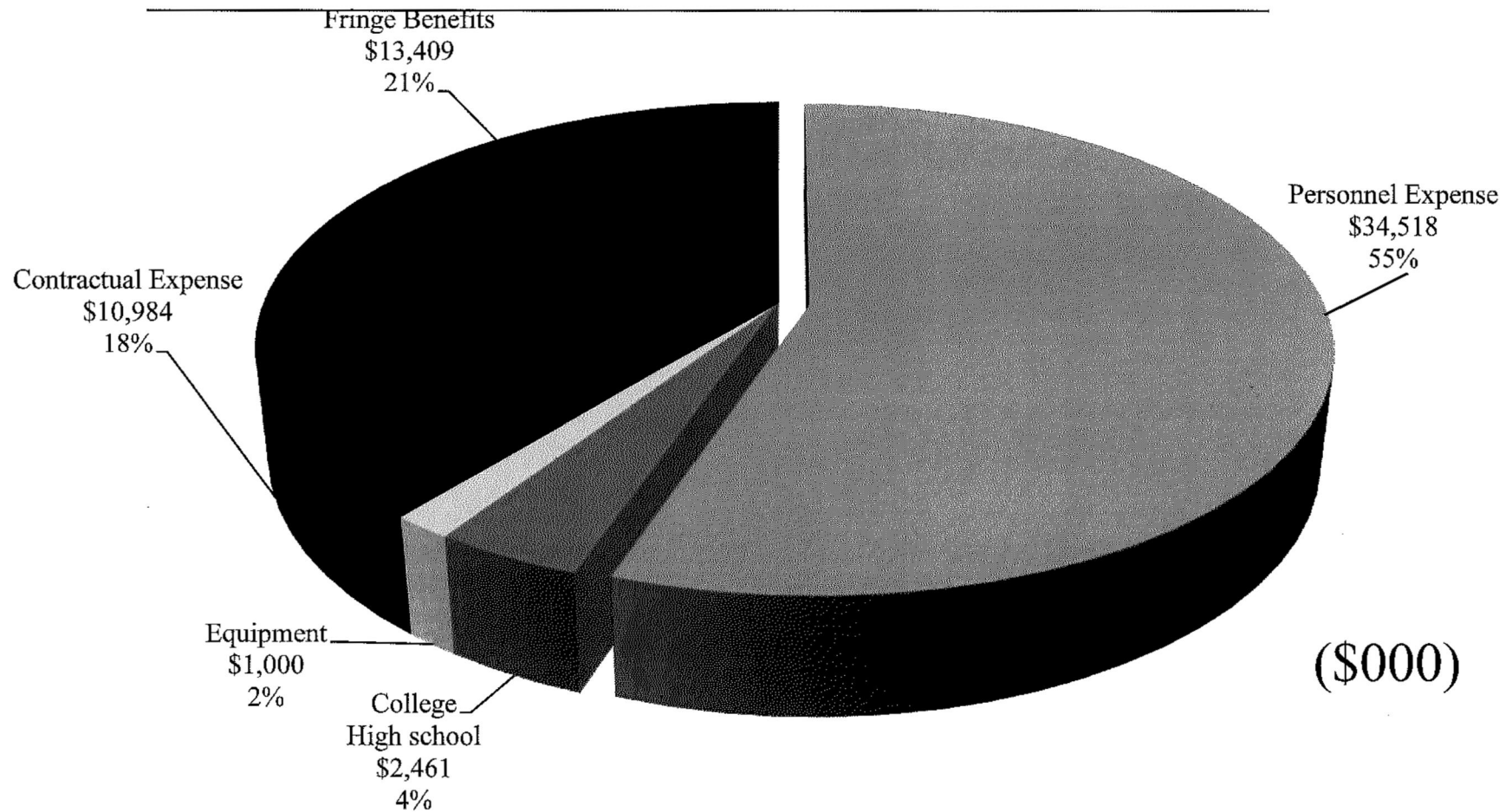

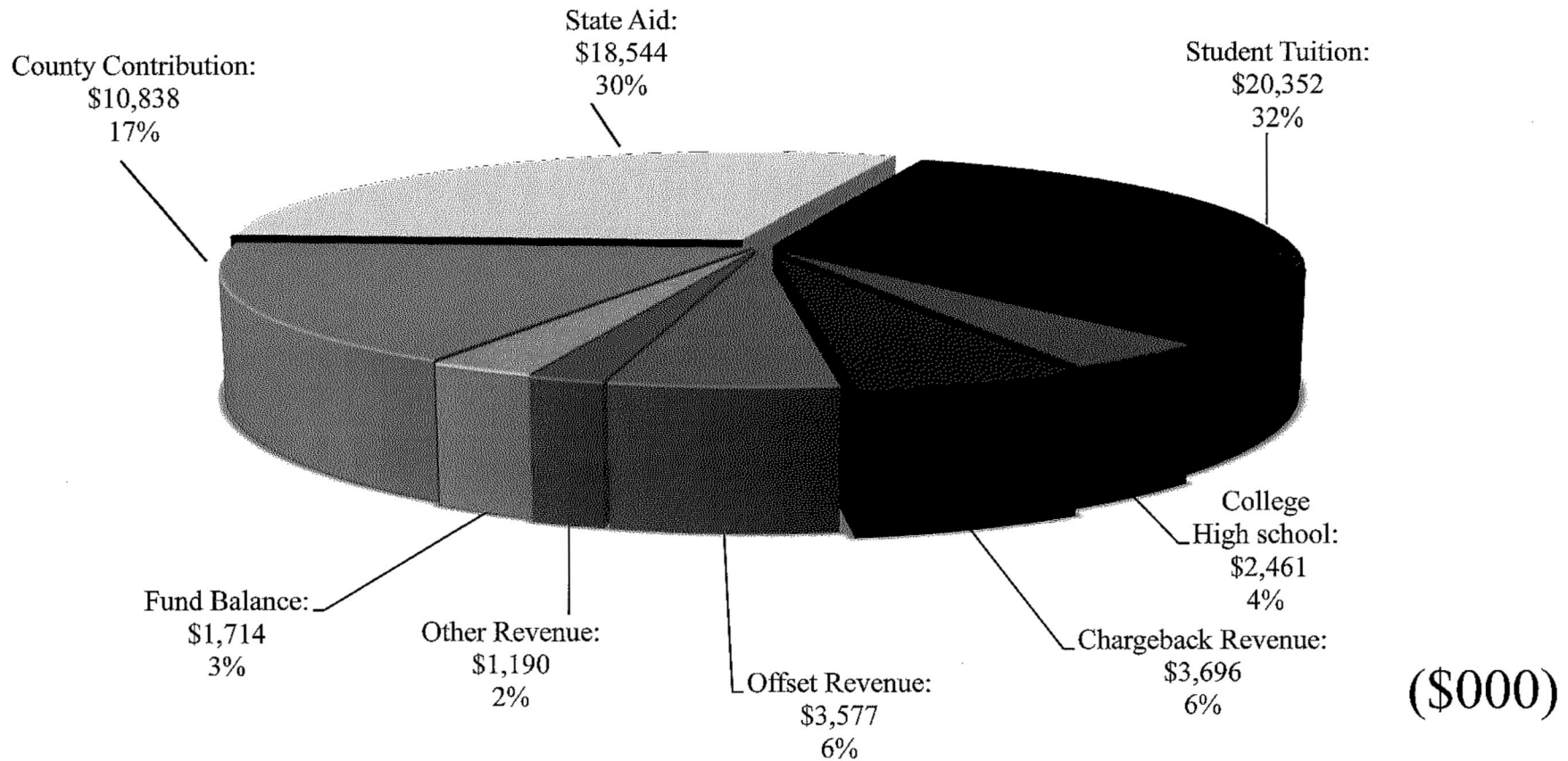

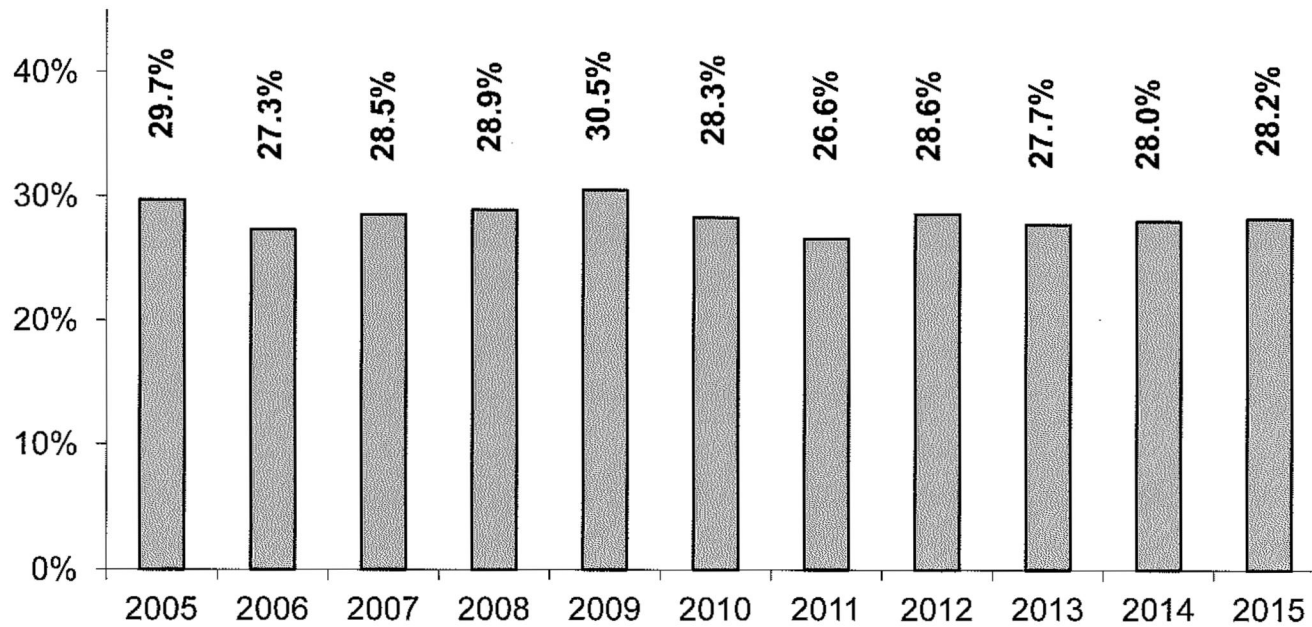

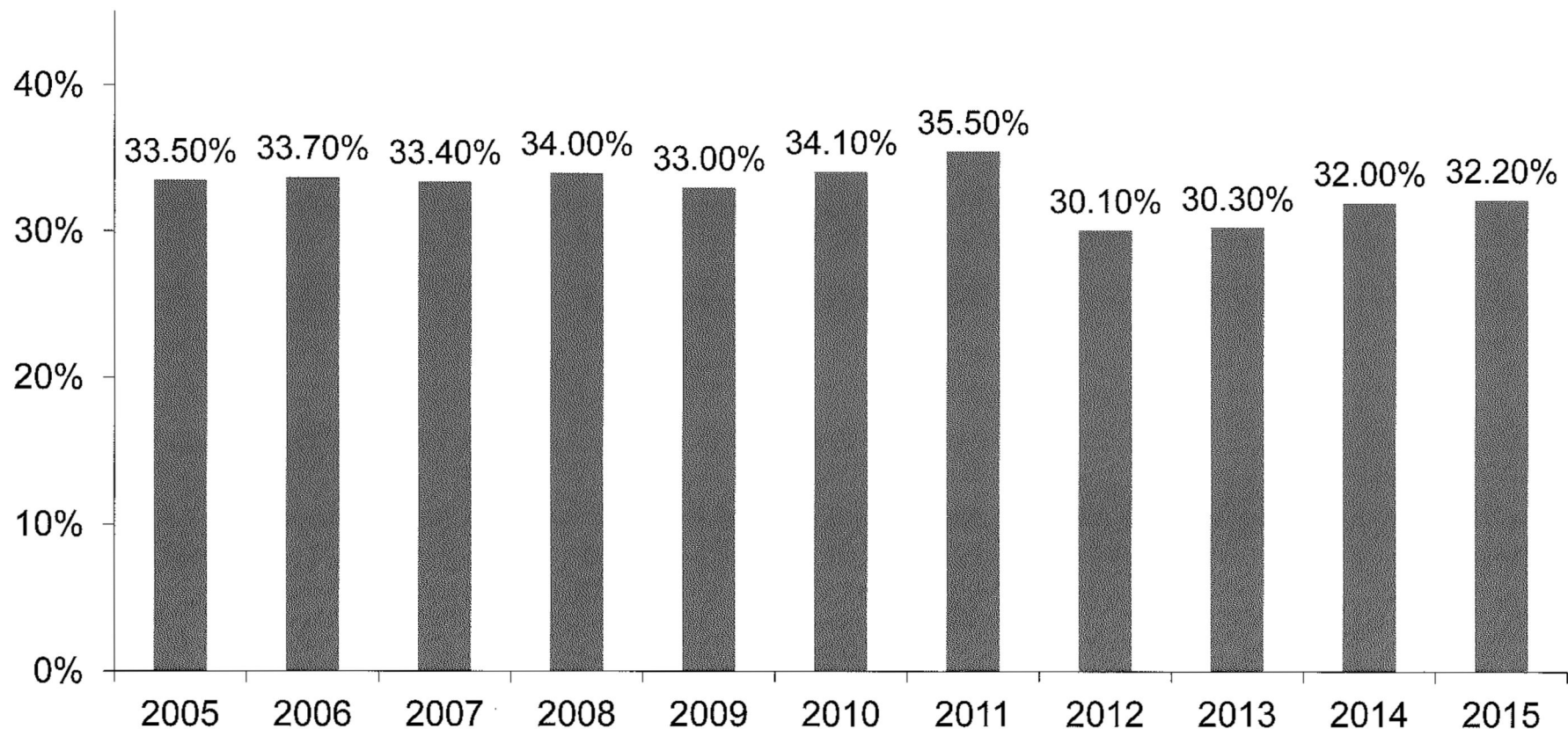

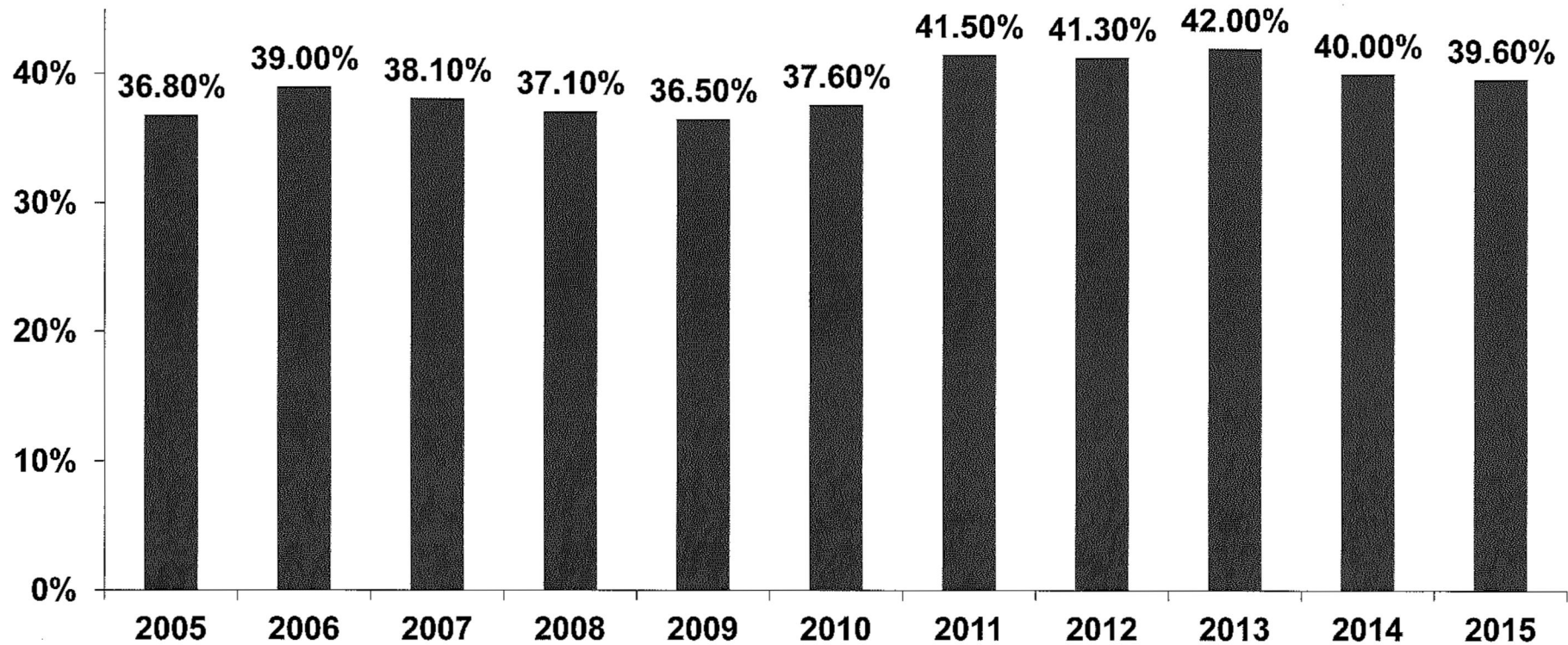

LOCAL LAW NO. _____ OF 2014

RE: A LOCAL LAW AMENDING LOCAL LAW NO. 9 OF 1991 (AS AMENDED BY LOCAL LAW NO. 3 OF 1998 AND LOCAL LAW NO. 2 OF 2011) REQUIRING ITEMIZED PRICING OF GOODS OFFERED FOR SALE AT RETAIL; THIS LOCAL LAW PROVIDES FOR ELIMINATION OF MANUAL TAGGING WHERE RETAILER PASSES AN ACCURACY INSPECTION AND FOR AN INCREASE IN PENALTIES

BE IT ENACTED by the County Legislature of the County of Dutchess as follows:

Section 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT.

The Legislature hereby finds and determines that Computer Assisted Checkout Systems (CACOS) are an accurate means of pricing consumer commodities and have become an indispensable technology for certain food establishment retailers. Employment of such technology obviates the requirement that is contained in existing laws in Dutchess County that individual items be price marked in Arabic numbers, so long as the accuracy of the CACOS system is established and the price of individual items is clearly marked on shelves and displays as provided herein. Other than New York City, Dutchess County is the last jurisdiction in the State to have a mandatory item pricing law without a scanner accuracy waiver provision. Some retailers will not operate in counties that mandate manual pricing which has the effect of limiting competition and economic expansion in Dutchess County. As such, the Legislature finds that other pricing systems should be permitted, subject to proper safeguards.

Section 2. DEFINITIONS.

1. The definitions employed in Local Law No. 9 of 1991 as amended by Local Law No. 3 of 1998 and Local Law No. 2 of 2011 shall apply herein.
2. Local Law No. 9 of 1991 as amended by Local Law No. 3 of 1998 and Local Law No. 2 of 2011 is hereby amended to the extent that all references to "retail food establishment" shall be changed to "retail space".
3. Section 4 of Local Law No. 9 of 1991 as amended by Local Law No. 3 of 1998 and Local Law No. 2 of 2011 shall be amended by deleting the existing text of the section and replacing it with a new section 4 as follows: "Section 4 – Employment of Computer Assisted Checkout Systems as satisfying the provisions of Dutchess County item pricing requirements."

A. Every retail store which uses a computer-assisted checkout system and which would otherwise be required to price mark each item as provided in Dutchess County may make an application, in writing, to the Dutchess County Commissioner of Health for a waiver of the item pricing requirement. Retail stores that are required by the law of their local jurisdiction to price mark each item are not qualified to apply for a waiver. A separate application shall be required for each qualified retail store. Each applicant shall be subject to a non-refundable waiver fee based upon the square footage of the retail area of each store as set according to the following schedule:

<u>1. Store's Square Footage of Retail Area</u>	<u>Waiver Fee</u>
1) 0 to 9,999 sq. ft.	\$ 500
2) 10,000 to 29,999 sq. ft.	\$ 1,000

3) 30,000 to 49,999 sq. ft.	\$ 3,500
4) 50,000 to 89,999 sq. ft.	\$ 5,000
5) 90,000 or more sq. ft.	\$15,000

2. *Waiver fees pursuant to this section may hereafter be revised and amended from time to time by resolution of the Dutchess County Legislature.*

B. Upon receipt of an application and fee as provided in subsection 1 above, the Commissioner of Health shall cause to be conducted a scanner count, location and accuracy inspection of the store for which the application has been submitted. At stores with a retail area in excess of 10,000 square feet, a minimum of 100 stock keeping items shall be checked at inspection. At stores with a retail area of 10,000 square feet or less, a minimum of fifty stock keeping units shall be checked. If the number of stock keeping units found to be in violation does not exceed two percent of those stock keeping units inspected, the Commissioner of Health shall grant to the applicant a one year revocable waiver for the item pricing requirement.

C. In the event that total violations in excess of two percent are discovered in the inspection process, the Commissioner of Health shall not grant a waiver to the applicant. Such a store may, within fifteen business days of being notified of the failure, request a second inspection. If the number of stock keeping units found to be in violation during this second inspection does not exceed two percent of those stock keeping units inspected, the Commissioner of Health shall grant to the applicant a one year revocable waiver for the item pricing requirement.

D. Stores whose waivers are revoked pursuant to subsection H or stores which, upon renewal for waiver, fail the scanner accuracy inspection(s) twice must comply with item pricing as set forth in Section 3 of Local Law No. 9 of 1991 as amended by Local Law No. 3 of 1998 and Local Law No. 2 of 2011 within thirty days from the final date of failure. Such a store will be prohibited from applying for a new waiver for one year from the date of revocation or second inspection failure.

E. Waivers shall be valid for a period of one year from the date of issuance, at which time the waiver shall expire. Stores must reapply annually for renewal. The waiver fee and inspection shall be required for each annual renewal application, as required for an original waiver application.

F. In the event that the Commissioner of Health is unable to conduct an inspection within 60 days of receipt of a completed application with the appropriate fee, then the Commissioner of Health will issue a temporary waiver pending the completion of the inspection process. The Commissioner of Health shall cause an inspection to be completed as soon as practicable. If, upon completion of an inspection, there is a violation rate of less than two percent, then the Commissioner of Health shall issue a permanent waiver with an expiration date of one year from the date of the issuance of the temporary waiver. If, upon completion of an inspection, there is a violation rate in excess of two percent, the temporary waiver shall be immediately revoked. Nevertheless, the store may, within 15 business days of being notified of the failure, request a second inspection. If the number of stock keeping units found to be in violation during this second inspection does not exceed two percent of those stock keeping units inspected, the Commissioner of Health shall grant to the applicant a one year revocable waiver for the item pricing requirement from the date of the issuance of the temporary waiver. If the store does not request a second inspection or if the store fails the second inspection, then the store must comply with the item pricing requirements set for the in Local Law above.

G. As a condition of the waiver from item pricing, each store must agree to meet all of the following requirements, and no regular or temporary waiver shall be granted to a store which has not agreed to these requirements in writing:

(1) The store shall make available price check scanners to enable consumers to confirm the price of stock keeping items. These price check scanners shall be in locations convenient to consumers with signs of sufficient sized lettering to identify the units to the consumers. Stores will submit their proposed sign and device locations to the Commissioner of Health for approval. In stores with multiple floors, there shall be at least one scanner conveniently located on each floor of the store. The number of conveniently located scanners shall also be dependent on the store's retail area:

<u>Store's Retail Area</u>	<u>Scanner</u>
Under 3,000 sq. ft.	1
Between 3,001 and 10,000 sq. ft.	2
Between 10,001 and 30,000 sq. ft.	3
Over 30,001 sq. ft.	Minimum of 3 and such additional scanners as the Commissioner may deem appropriate; and

(2) Stores must also have a shelf price for each stock keeping item which is visible to the consumer and which are located directly under the item on the shelf on which the item is displayed; or if the item is not conspicuously visible to the consumer, by a sign or list conspicuously placed at the point of procurement. Failure to display the shelf price for a stock keeping item shall constitute a violation. The Commissioner of Health may specify standard shape, typeface, placement and format of shelf prices and may set other requirements to ensure the readability of shelf prices and the ability of consumers to identify which shelf prices applies to each stock keeping item. This subdivision shall not be construed to diminish the requirements of section 214-h of the New York State Agriculture and Markets Law, section 197-b of the *New York State Agriculture and Markets Law*, or the New York State Regulations at 1 NYCRR 345.1 et seq, but shall be in addition thereto.

(3) The store shall not charge any consumer a price for any stock keeping item (SKI) that exceeds the item, shelf, sale or advertised price of the SKI.

(4) The store shall make prompt payment to consumers who have been overcharged and shall correct all pricing errors identified by consumers.

(5) The store shall post, in a conspicuous place, the refund policy of such retail store in the event of an overcharge.

H. The Commissioner of Health may revoke a waiver from item pricing for any of the following reasons:

- (1) Failure to comply with any provisions of this Local Law;
- (2) Deliberate overcharging of any consumer;
- (3) Material misrepresentation in the application for a waiver.

Section 3.

PENALTIES.

Section 5 (a) of Local Law No. 9 of 1991 is hereby amended as follows:

5 (a) a violation of any provision of this local law or of any rule or regulation promulgated hereunder shall be punishable upon proof thereof, by the payment of a civil penalty in the sum of not more than \$100 for each violation per SKU with a maximum fine of **\$7,500** per inspection.

5 (b) failure to display the selling price of any SKU consistent with this act shall be punishable upon proof thereof by payment of a civil penalty in the sum of \$100 per violation per SKU with a maximum fine of **\$7,500** per inspection.

Section 4.

SEVERABILITY.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the cause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

Section 5.

EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Local Law, if enacted, shall take effect on October 1, 2014.

NYPIRG opposes this proposal, which would effectively repeal Dutchess County's Item Pricing Law. NYPIRG has fought for consumer rights since 1973 and led the campaign to enact local item pricing laws when the statewide item pricing law lapsed in 1991.

Item pricing laws provide fundamental protections to consumers when they go to their local supermarkets to purchase life essentials, including groceries, dairy products, dry goods, healthcare products and basic necessities, such as paper goods.

The proposed local law's "Legislative Intent" section points out the faulty logic in this proposal:

The Legislature hereby finds and determines that Computer Assisted Checkout Systems (CACOS) are an accurate means of pricing consumer commodities and have become an indispensable technology for certain food establishment retailers. Employment of such technology obviates the requirement that is contained in existing laws in Dutchess County that individual items be price marked in Arabic numerals, so long as the accuracy of the CACOS system is established and the price of individual items is clearly marked on shelves and displays as provided herein. . . .

First, computer scanners are rarely 100% accurate. The proposal would allow up to 2% of errors to result in an item pricing waiver. If only the IRS was so forgiving. Moreover, 2% of the tens of thousands of items in large supermarkets means that consumers may be overcharged a huge amount of money. **And it's not about the technology, it's typically human error—** failure to input sale items, price changes and other data into computers. For the most part, when

a sharp-eyed consumer spots an overcharge and complains, the supermarket corrects the problem prospectively—but all the shoppers who came before and were overcharged are not compensated. The store ends up ahead. The risks of local officials catching the error and fining the supermarket are minimal. The risks of repercussions from mistakes are small for supermarkets.¹

Second, even if computer scanners were 100% accurate, they don't replace the benefits to consumers of individually marked items. Item pricing allows consumers to easily compare items that are similar but found in different parts of the store—dry pasta versus refrigerated soft pasta, for example. It also allows consumers on tight budgets—and who isn't these days?—to tote up what's in their carts so they don't go over budget. Individually marked items also let you compare the prices to the items that you're replacing on your home shelves—from the same store or a competitor.

Third, providing scanners for shoppers to check prices is inconvenient and in any event doesn't act as a check on the register scanners. The requirement that there be no more than three scanners as a default requirement in a huge supermarkets makes it inconvenient to compare shelf price to the scanned price. Moreover, since these aisle scanners are hooked up to the same computer as the register scanners, they just reinforce that the price at the register is the right one, even if it's inaccurate. That's not independent verification of price—it just reinforces to the consumer that a potentially wrong price is accurate. If you look at a broken clock a second time, it's still wrong.

Scanners save supermarkets a good deal of money by speeding checkout, managing inventory and helping with profiling and marketing to customers. These are reasons that supermarkets use scanners. **Scanners and item pricing are completely compatible; there's no reason to ditch item pricing because scanner systems are in place.** Moreover, prices don't increase due to item pricing. The law creates a level playing field within the county and *supermarket chains advertise regionally* and thus consumers with consumer protections are asked to pay the same price as those in counties without similar safeguards.

NYPIRG urges that you reject this misguided proposal.

¹ An aggressive regime of repeated, random, unannounced, undercover inspections is critically important to catch scanner accuracy problems. My name is Matthew Martini and I live in Beacon, NY

I am writing you today because I will not be able to attend tonight's committee meeting and I wanted to share with you my opposition to Resolution #2014198, Elimination of Individual Itemized Pricing.

I believe that this is the same resolution this legislature has put on the agenda and then removed several times. I know I spoke against this resolution at a full board meeting and hoped it would be pulled and reconsidered, however this did not happen. This resolution still has the same faulty language in it that makes it a terrible solution.

The resolution, as currently written, still does not provide enough scanners, provides a high percentage of errors on the scanners hurting consumers, and does not provide enough checks and balances for the protection of consumers.

Without a sufficient amount of scanners in the store it will be extremely difficult for consumers to compare prices for the same product, for example dry pasta vs. frozen pasta (found in two different sections of the supermarket)

The current resolution would allow up to 2% of errors to result in an item-pricing waiver. 2% of the thousands of items in supermarkets means that consumers may be overcharged and if someone catches the error what about the people who went before him or her? They would have been overcharged without a refund.

The current resolution also allows the Commissioner of Health to issue a waiver of item Pricing if the Department of Health is unable to inspect the store for accuracy of the scanners, there is no limit on this waiver. The resolution states, "The Commissioner of Health shall cause an inspection to be completed as soon as practicable." I personally do not believe this is appropriate for consumer protection.

I think the best possible solution to this matter is to bring all the parties interested together to discuss this. The Labor at the supermarket needs to be present for these discussions, as of April 2014, no one from the United Food and Commercial Workers Local 1500 has been contacted regarding this legislation.

Itemized Pricing and scanners can co-exist in the supermarket and maybe there is a way to make that happen, but all the parties involved need to come together and discuss it.

I urge the Legislators to pull this resolution and make the appropriate changes to protect consumers and keep jobs in our Hudson Valley.

> However, I want to take this opportunity, in advance of the next meeting cycle, to call your attention to the Legislature's Rules as it pertains to abstaining from a vote. It is addressed in Rule 4.13.

> Permission from the Chair is required to abstain from any vote. This applies to Committees and the Meeting of the Legislature. If one requests permission and it is not granted and a legislator then refuses to vote, a vote is deemed to have been cast with the prevailing side on the resolution. That is a yes if the resolution passes, and a no, if it fails. If the vote is otherwise tied, it will be deemed a no vote.

> Furthermore, if you have a conflict you cannot participate in the debate.

> In your case, you requested an opinion from the Board of Ethics and they determined that there is not a conflict for you to sponsor the local law or to vote on the resolution. Just a statement about your daughter's job at Price Chopper and the donations for City events would be appropriate. 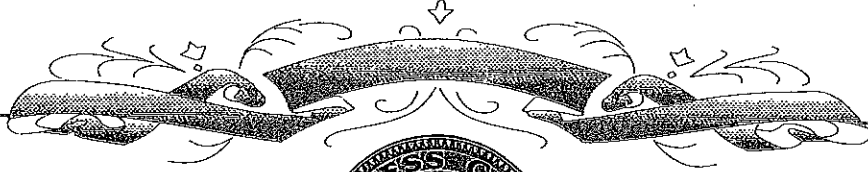

Whereas, Olive was a Member of the Presbyterian Church where she served as president, trustee and treasurer of the Presbyterian Women's Association and she was former treasurer of the Friends of the Pleasant Valley Library and she was also a member and past president of the Pleasant Valley Historical Society, a member and past president of the Dutchess County Historical Society and a member of the Association of NYS Public Historians, who awarded her the Franklin D. Roosevelt Local Government Professional Achievement Award in 2002, and

Whereas, Olive will be fondly remembered as the Pleasant Valley Town Historian from 1985-2008 and during her tenure, organized the archives, wrote 3 books on Pleasant Valley and supervised the move and presentation of the Mill Site Museum and she also was a regular speaker on Pleasant Valley to girl scouts, boy scouts, cub scouts and brownies and Traver and West Road School students, and

Whereas, in 1992 Olive was honored by the Pleasant Valley Grange as Citizen of the Year, in 2006 she was awarded the Helen Wilkinson Award by the Dutchess County Historical Society and in 2008 she was recognized as one of the Senior Citizens of the Year by the Dutchess County Office of the Aging, and
