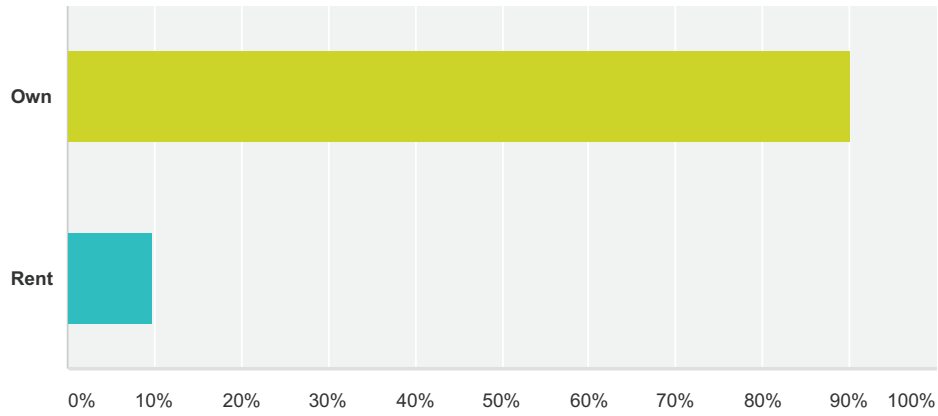

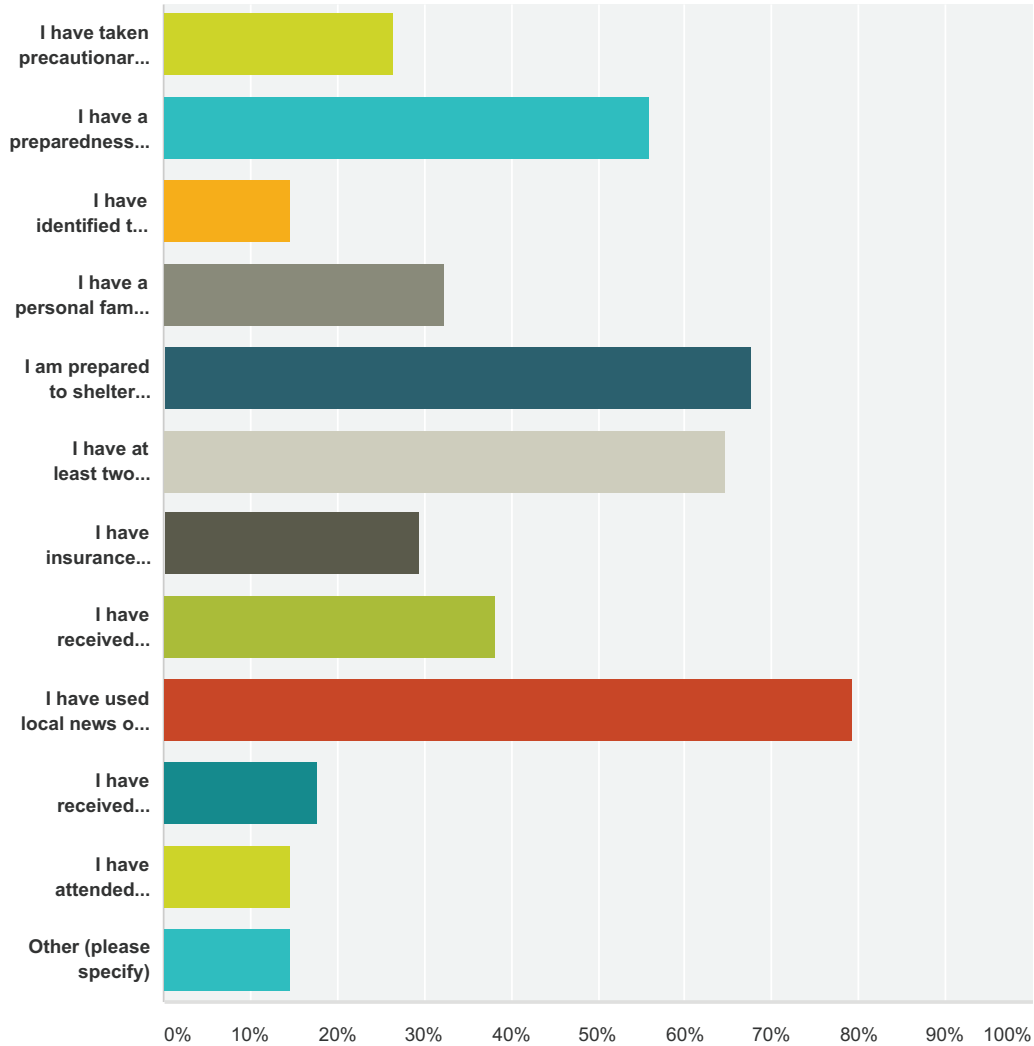

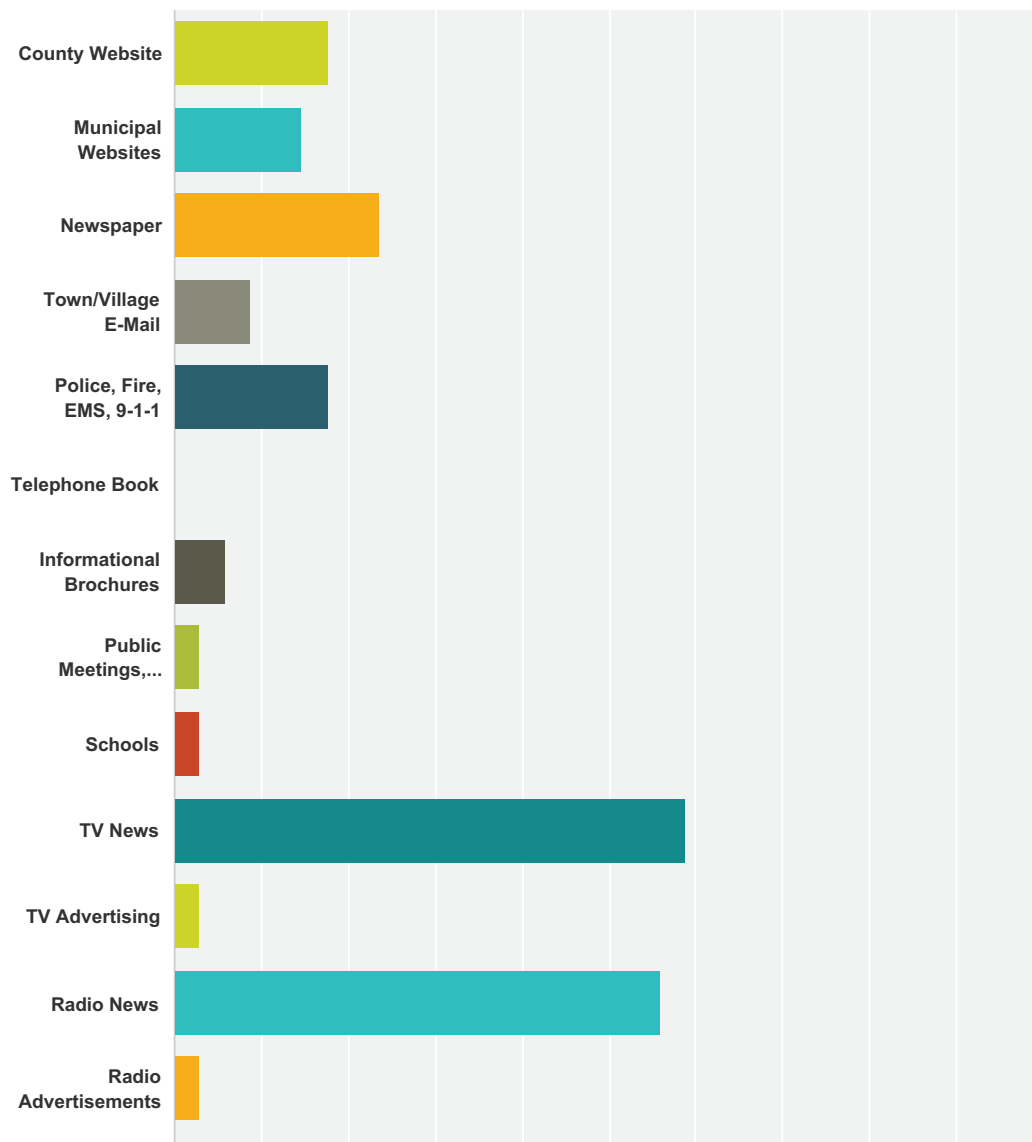

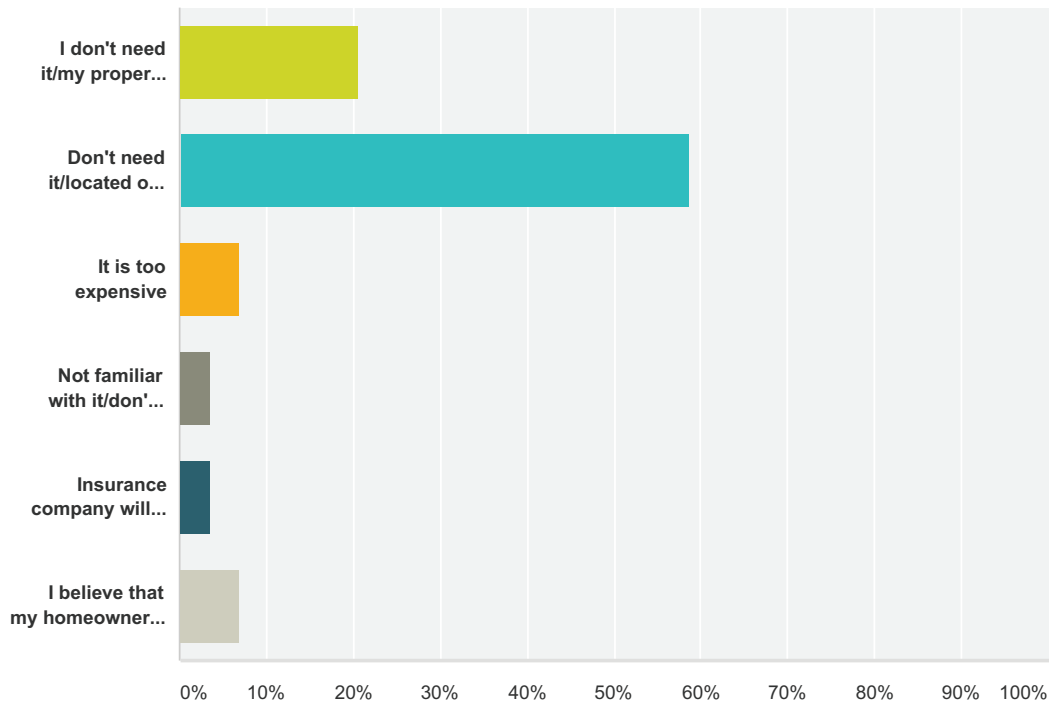

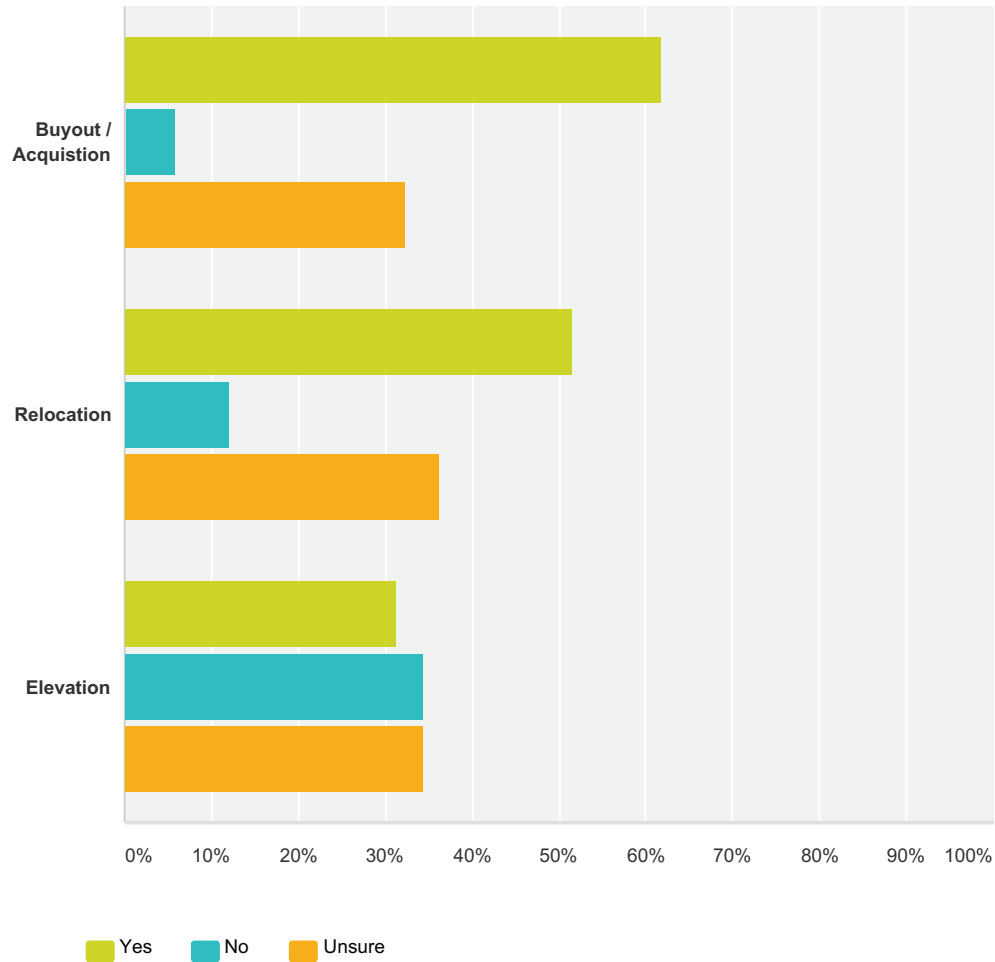

Communication systems (landline phone, cellphone, and internet) are likewise vulnerable to weather damage, and provision of back-up power for these facilities is inconsistent, and dependent on the carrier and other local availability. Communication systems are also prone to nearly immediate overload in the event of a natural disaster.

The public is at times startlingly uninformed as to the operation and availability of emergency services. There are residents in every community in Dutchess County who, if asked, would be unaware of whether the fire department serving their residence was career or volunteer, whether it provides EMS, and where its closest station is located. Speaking for my department, we cover a mix of village, suburban, and very rural areas, and it is increasingly common for people to buy or build houses in our area, move in, and experience their first extended power outage or other natural event without having any idea how to survive in their home without electricity - ie, backup power, sump pumps, auxiliary heating equipment, etc.
