
Q3 How long have you lived here?

Q13 If you do NOT have flood insurance, what is the primary reason?





Speaking for my department, we cover a mix of village, suburban, and very rural areas, and it is increasingly common for people to buy or build houses in our area, move in, and experience their first extended power outage or other natural event without having any idea how to survive in their home without electricity - ie, backup power, sump pumps, auxiliary heating equipment, etc.
